Asian Congress of Architects (ACA)

A vital feature is the Asian Congress of Architects (ACA) which is a major regional conference that is held every two years and coinciding with a meeting of the Council.

Asian Congress of Architects (ACA) is more than a conference for the intellectual exchange of current architectural ideas. It is also a memorable convivial occasion that combines cultural activities of the participants. The host Institute for the conference is selected from the Member Institute.

The First Asian Congress took place in October 1984 at the Philippine International Convention Center, Manila, Philippines with the theme “Strategies for Asian Architect” and the rest is history.

ARCASIA Forum

One of the key features of ARCASIA is the ARCASIA Forum which is a platform for the ongoing discussion of current architectural ideas pertinent to the region. This is a gathering of prominent architects and thinkers intended to serve as an Asian “catapult of minds” on matters concerning architecture and environment in the Asian context.

The ARCASIA Gold Medal Award of Excellence for Architecture

A Biennial Award instituted by ARCASIA for Exemplary Architectural Projects in the ARCASIA region.

The Award was authored by Ar Syed Zaigham Jafery {IAP} in behalf of Institute of Architects Pakistan {IAP}. It was approved by the ARCASIA Council during the Twelfth ARCASIA Council Meeting in Beijing, September 1991.

The first ARCASIA Award was during the ACA 5, Lahore in 1992, followed by ACA 6, Manila in 1996; Seoul in 1998; Colombo in 2000; Singapore in 2002; Macau in 2004; and Beijing in 2006.

AIMS and OBJECTIVES

1. To acknowledge exemplary architectural works;
2. To encourage the sustenance of the Asian spirit; the development and improvement of the Asian built environment; and
3. Enhancement of the role of architecture and architects in the socio – economic and cultural life of Asian countries.

The AWARD:

A GOLD Medal Award is given for each category every two years.

The entries and judging is during the ARCASIA Forum and the awarding ceremonies is during the Asian Congress of Architects.

The AWARDS JURY

The Jury is composed of:

- Incumbent ARCASIA Chairman
- Incumbent Convenor of ARCASIA Award: Permanent Convenor is Ar. Syed Zaigham Jaffery {IAP}
- An eminent non – architect personality from the host country of ARCASIA Forum where the entries/winners are to be adjudged
- Two [2] eminent Architects from the ARCASIA Zones other than the Zone represented by the Incumbent ARCASIA Chairman
- An eminent Architect from any region other than the ARCASIA Region

ARCASIA Fellowship

Proposal for the Establishment of an ARCASIA Fellowship

GENERAL CONSIDERATION

ARCASIA was formulated by the six Asian Institute members of the Commonwealth Association of Architects (CAA) in 1967 during the CAA/New Delhi Conference and regular meetings of the foundation council took place between 1967 to 1978. In 1979, ARCASIA was established with the signing of the Constitution in Jakarta. The first meeting of ARCASIA took place in Bangkok in 1980. Since then it has met annually. Most Member Institutes' representatives attending ARCASIA meetings were either Presidents of their own Institute or senior member of the profession. Owing to the particular qualification of member Institute representatives to ARCASIA meetings i. e. President or his representative and Chairman of the Board of Architectural Education, most representative could only attend once though some managed to return for another meeting. One meeting's participation is normally just enough to wet the appetite of the attendees but not enough to be fully equipped for the meeting.

Thus a lot of time was spent on briefing new representatives or tracing old records during the sessions. In view of this shortcoming, two past Chairmen have been appointed advisers since the 1984 meeting. It was felt that a means should be devised within ARCASIA to take advantage of the wealth and connections of past Institute representatives not only to enable

them to participate in ARCASIA activities but also to form continuous hard core of people enthusiastic about the cause.

Individual membership was suggested but turned down as a possible dilution of ARCASIA as a Council of Presidents. A Fellowship seems to be the best solution. During the last Council Meeting in Singapore, the proposal to establish a Fellowship was again brought up and I was asked to formalize the proposal.

The CONSTITUTION of the ARCASIA FELLOWSHIP

1. OBJECTIVE - To establish a Fellowship of ARCASIA to enable Member Institute representatives who had attended ARCASIA meetings in the past to maintain close contact with ARCASIA and to participate in ARCASIA activities.
2. COMPOSITION & STATUS OF THE FELLOWSHIP - The Fellowship shall consist of a President, an Honorary Secretary and members. The Fellowship shall be independent from ARCASIA except in matters of finance and administration.
3. QUALIFICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP - Any ARCASIA Institute member's official representatives who had attended one meeting of ARCASIA and all Past ARCASIA officials (Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer) proposed by

two members of the Fellowship is eligible to join the Fellowship. All past Chairmen and Deputy Chairmen of ARCASIA shall automatically become members of the Fellowship.

4. ELECTION OF MEMBERSHIP ARCASIA shall appoint the first President of the Fellowship who, in turn shall appoint the Honorary Secretary and invite those qualified to join as initial members of the Fellowship. Thereafter any one eligible for the membership proposed by two members and endorsed by the President shall become members.
5. THE PRESIDENT & HONORARY SECRETARY - The President and Honorary Secretary shall be appointed for a term of two years being eligible for a further term of office but no person shall be appointed to the two post for more than four years. Any two members of the Fellowship can propose a member of the Fellowship who has been member for two years to be a candidate for the Presidency. Election for the positions shall be carried by the majority of the votes during the general meeting.
6. GENERAL MEETING OF THE FELLOWSHIP & QUORUM - The annual Fellowship General Meeting shall take place one day before the ARCASIA meeting or at any time called by the President or by not less 20% of the membership of the Fellowship with 30 days' notice. The quorum shall be 20% of the membership of the Fellowship.

7. COMMITTEES - The Fellowship shall appoint committees for the purpose of dealing with specific projects connected with the function of the Fellowship. The Fellowship shall appoint the Chairman of all committees and decide on the terms of reference.

8. FUNCTIONS OF THE FELLOWSHIP - It can act collectively as an advisory body to ARCASIA. It can generate funds to carry out promote and finance projects for ARCASIA. The President shall make a report of the Fellowship's activities to ARCASIA annually.

9. RIGHTS OF THE MEMBERS OF THE FELLOWSHIP - Members of the Fellowship shall be entitled to attend all ARCASIA meetings as observers but not to vote and can speak with the Chairman's permission.

10. COMMUNICATION - Each member of the Fellowship is entitled to receive circulars for all ARCASIA activities.

11. ADMINISTRATION - The ARCASIA Secretariate shall act as the administration centre for the Fellowship under the direction of the President, and Honorary Secretary of the Fellowship. The administration shall include distribution of circulars maintenance of a Fellowship member's list, collection of subscriptions, accounts of the Fellowship and any other matter related to the running of the Fellowship.

12. INSIGNIA OF MEMBERSHIP OF THE FELLOWSHIP - A specially designed lapel pin will be given

to new members of the Fellowship during a formal presentation ceremony to be included in the annual ARCASIA Fellowship meeting.

13. SUBSCRIPTION - An annual subscription of US \$50 shall be paid by each member of the Fellowship to the Fellowship account in the ARCASIA Secretariate. The amount of annual subscription shall be reviewed and decided by the Fellowship from time to time. The annual subscription is due at the start of each fiscal year for ARCASIA or upon notice of election to the Fellowship.

14. CODE OF CONDUCT - Members of the Fellowship are bound by the ARCASIA International Code of Ethics and Code of Conduct of their own Institute.

15. EXPULSION - Any member of the Fellowship being two years in arrears of the annual dues is automatically retires as a member of the Fellowship. Any member suspended or expelled from their own national Institute or cease to be a member of that Institute, shall automatically be retired as a member of the Fellowship.

16. DISSOLUTION - The Fellowship may be dissolved only by two third majority of the total membership voting at a general meeting.

17. INTERPRETATION - The Fellowship's interpretation of these Clauses shall be final.

The ARCASIA Committee for Architectural Education (ACAЕ)

The ARCASIA Committee for Architectural Education (ACAЕ) is formerly known as the ARCASIA Board of Architectural Education (ABAE). It is the education arm of ARCASIA and consists of the Chairman of the Boards of Architectural Education of the various member Institutes of Architects or their alternate representatives. It meets annually parallel with the ARCASIA Council Meeting.

Objectives of ACAЕ:

- To advise and administer on behalf of the Council all matters pertaining to architectural education.
- To coordinate the work of Member Institutes' Board of Architectural Education.
- To help Member Institutes and schools of Architecture in the region to achieve their national aims.
- To help schools of Architecture in the region to achieve and maintain standards relevant to their respective national needs.
- To promote interchange of students and teachers among Member Institutes and abroad.
- To represent the region at national and international forums and bodies on matters pertaining to architectural education.
- To implement decision of the Committee with the concurrence of the Council.

The ARCASIA Architectural Students Jamboree

Accompanying each Asian Congress of Architects is the gathering of architectural students from member countries of ARCASIA under the auspices of the ARCASIA Committee for Architectural Education (ACAЕ), the ARCASIA Architectural Student Jamboree.

The objectives are:

- To facilitate talented Asian students of architecture to travel in the region and experience the architecture of different but related environments from their own;
- To foster among the up-and-coming generation of architects in the region a better understanding of each other's countries and their contemporary conditions and problems;
- To encourage the building of Inter-personal contacts between the architectural students in the region;
- To promote an awareness among Asian architectural students of the role and work of ARCASIA and ACAЕ and to engender their support to and future participation as architects in these institutions; and
- To enliven ARCASIA deliberations by the presence of students.

ARCASIA Students Competition

The ARCASIA Students Competition was first conceived and organized by Institute of Architects Pakistan {IAP} for the Students Jamboree held in conjunction with the Fifth Asian Congress of Architects {ACA-5} at Lahore, Pakistan in 1992. Each Member Institute conducted a Design Competition on a predetermined theme to select two best entries from amongst the student competitors in their home country and sent the winning entries for Exhibition to the Lahore Jamboree as part of the events of the Fifth Asian Congress of Architects {ACA 5}.

The success of the 1992 Lahore IAP venture prompted the ARCASIA Council and the ARCASIA Committee for Architectural Education {ACAЕ} to decide at the 1993 ARCASIA Council Meeting in Hong Kong to hold the Competition on a regular basis in conjunction with the Students Jamboree and the Asian Congress of Architects (ACA) in order to encourage Asian Architecture students of the Member Institutes.

Japan Institute of Architects {JIA} agreed to sponsor this Competition in the amount of Yen 300,000 (US \$ 2900) as the First Prize to shoulder the travel expenses of the winning student. The other winners are to be given Certificates of Recognition.

OBJECTIVES:

- To encourage the Asian Architectural Students to be sensitive toward their own Architecture, the Architecture of their region;
- To encourage a healthy design Competition among the students of the Member Institutes; and
- To acknowledge talented Asian Architectural Students.

ARCASIA Research Center

Rationale:

Asia is a continent of rich and diverse culture. The varied histories of its people contributed to the enrichment of the distinct Asian civilization. It is because of these diversities that the study of Asian Architecture and everything that is germane to it becomes interesting subjects.

The ARCASIA Research Center is envisioned to be the crossroad in the promotion and understanding among the different cultures in Asia. It will initiate researches that will enhance cooperation and collaboration among the members of the ARCASIA countries.

Objectives:

- To provide a forum for Asian architects engaged in research;
- To network Asian architects through the exchange of students conducted in their native lands;
- To develop the spirit of oneness by learning the mores and traditions of other Asian countries; and
- To develop a metaphor for Asian cultural identity.

The First ARCASIA Research Forum was held in Camp John Hay Convention Center, Baguio City, Philippines last October 29, 2006 during the National Conference of Architects of the United Architects of the Philippines (UAP).

ARCASIA Committee for Architectural Practice (ACAP)

The ARCASIA Committee on Practice was formed at the Twenty First ARCASIA Council Meeting held in Kuala Lumpur on 5-6 September 2000. The Singapore Institute of Architects (SIA) was appointed to lead in spearheading the Committee.

The first meeting was convened in Singapore on 28 April 2001 attended by HKIA, PAM, AAM, KIRA and VAA and concluded that the committee's main focus is to "study and recommend guidelines on the best practices of architecture."

The SIA was again task to revive the committee during the Twenty Fifth ARCASIA Council Meeting in Macau on 28-29 November 2004. The committee convened on 23 September 2004 in Singapore attended by PAM, SIA and ASA. The committee resolved to conduct an annual meeting on Professional Practice during ARCASIA Council Meeting similar to ACAE.

The proposal was approved during the 26th ARCA-SIA Council Meeting in Chiang Mai, Thailand on November 28-30, 2005, thus the birth of the ARCA-SIA Committee on Professional Practice (ACAP) in Chiang Mai, Thailand.

Objectives:

- To enable a basic understanding of architecture practice and the various laws and regulations governing practice in each country;

- To facilitate those Institutes who are in the process of establishing professional practice framework in their respective countries to leverage from the experience of those who have an established process; and
- To establish a basis for which to discuss cross-border practices amongst member countries in view of globalization.

ARCASIA Committee on Green & Sustainable Architecture (ACGSA)

2004

The Committee on Green & Sustainable Architecture was proposed by Chairman Elect Yolanda D. Reyes in 2004 under the chairmanship of Kazuo Iwamura (JIA) as its first Chairman.

The committee was institutionalized as a permanent working committee of ARCASIA

ARCASIA MANILA DECLARATION - CODE OF ETHICS FOR CONSULTING SERVICES

BACKGROUND ON THE FORMULATION OF THE INTERNATIONAL CODE OF ETHICS ON CONSULTING SERVICES

Since 1972, when the United Nations General Assembly adopted the United Nations Charter on Economic Rights and Duties of States, several U.N. conferences on habitat and technology transfer were held in different cities of the world. The results of said conferences were resolutions and proposals some of which were:

1. The New International Economic Order, declaring the rights of the government and people of a country to choose its means and goals of development;
2. Proposals to attain self-reliance and proper transfer of technology in developing countries; and
3. Approaches to the development of human settlements.

Unfortunately, it is often the experience in many developing countries that foreign professionals commissioned by industrialized countries or by international lending institutions as consultants impose solutions that are not sufficiently sensitive to the environment, culture and aspirations of the people of the country who are the recipients of the loan and development, thus running counter to the principles adopted in the United Nations conferences.

It is therefore important that an "International Code of Ethics on Consulting Services" be formulated in order to define the role and responsibilities of consultants doing work in a foreign country and to stipulate the rights of the local professionals in the development of their country, all of which, should be in consonance with the New International Economic Order and the other principles adopted in the United Nations conferences.

With this as an objective, the Architects Regional Council of Asia (ARCASIA) whose membership is composed of ten (10) accredited architectural organizations from ten (10) countries in Asia, namely: Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Hongkong, Malaysia, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Sri-Lanka and Thailand, formulated a document entitled "International Code of Ethics on Consulting Services" in Manila on March 28, 1981. On August 6, 1981, it was formally adopted in Hongkong.

At the meeting of the Governing Council of the ASEAN Association for Planning and Housing (AAPH) held in Manila on September 18-20, 1981, the Council approved the adoption of the Code and was ratified during the AAPH Conference at Jakarta, Indonesia on December 7-11, 1981.

From ARCASIA and AAPH, the International Code has also been formulated by the following:

1. Philippine Federation of Professional Associations (PFPA) under whose membership are thirty-one (31) Philippine professional organizations accredited by the Professional Regulation Commission with a total membership of some 500,000 professionals;

2. Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) making it mandatory that this document be adhered to by all Filipino professionals; and

3. Philippine Council for Planning and Housing (PCPH), an organization whose membership is composed of professionals, professional organizations and developers involved in housing, planning and land development.

The "International Code of Ethics on Consulting Services" will be presented to national, regional and international organizations with the hope that once it is accepted by said organizations, it will foster better understanding and greater mutual cooperation among professionals of all nations.

INTERNATIONAL CODE OF ETHICS ON CONSULTING SERVICES

THE CONFERENCE:

RECOGNIZING the fundamental role of consulting services in the social and economic development of all countries, particularly in the developing countries;

AWARE of the role of consulting services in the creative fashioning of man's environment to the end that they will contribute to the fulfillment of his life, taking into account the diversity of national cultures in meeting aesthetic standards;

DESIRING to strengthen national capabilities in terms of consulting services by promoting the fullest flow of relevant information suited to the specific needs of developing countries in particular;

BELIEVING that it is now timely to set forth a statement of universal policies and principles in a Code of Ethics in order to enhance the creative role of the consulting services towards the establishment of a new international economic order and as a basis for scientific and technical cooperation of all countries;

AFFIRMING the benefits to be derived from a universally applicable Code of Ethics to which all professional individuals, institutions and enterprises concerned should conform,

HEREBY DECLARES THIS:

INTERNATIONAL CODE OF ETHICS ON CONSULTING SERVICES AS THE COMMON STANDARD OF CONDUCT FOR ALL PROFESSIONALS PER- FORMING CONSULTING SERVICES IN ALL NATIONS.

Article 1. (1) In all professional undertakings, it is essential to consider the system of values and culture prevailing in each country, and standards must be determined on a national basis. This is dictated by the consideration that standards which are valid for the most advanced industrial countries may be inappropriate or may entail unwarranted social costs for the developing countries. (2) There shall be no attempt to impose solutions of one society on other societies.

Article 2. Based on the principle that the responsibility for the development of every country rests primarily upon itself, the local consultant or professional shall have the primary right to interpret the needs of his people, and his vision as to how his country's environment could be built, planned, improved or enhanced shall be entitled to respect.

Article 3. The environment that the professionals are committed to fashion shall be expressive of the genius of the people and reflective of the substance of their culture.

Article 4. As a corollary to the foregoing principles, every consultant from a foreign country, whether his work is a result of a government-to-government agreement or a requirement of the funding institution or a project from a private sector, shall associate and work harmoniously with consultants or professionals of the country where the project is located.

Article 5. To accelerate the transfer of appropriate technology, consultants from developing and developed countries shall, through their interaction, extend to each other the fullest assistance and access to information.

Article 6. Consulting services shall be performed by individual professionals or consultants possessing the necessary qualifications, education, experience and legal registration and license to practice or by firms whose principals and heads are professionals qualified to perform the required services and are responsible for the performance of the staff of said firms.

Article 7. (1) The consultant's professional qualifications and integrity are his warranty that the best interest of the public and the country where the services are to be performed are served when his services are retained. (2) To insure the professional independence and objectives of consultants, they should be engaged solely for the purpose of rendering professional and consultancy services and shall not have direct or indirect interest in commercial, fabricating, marketing, manufacturing or contracting activities.

Article 8. (1) The consultant is engaged in a profession which carries with it responsibilities towards his client, the public and his co-professionals, whether such responsibilities are the natural outcome of good citizenship or of his professional pursuit. (2) These duties and responsibilities cannot be properly discharged unless his motives, conduct, sense of moral values and ability are such as to command respect and confidence.

Article 9. Every country has professional regulation laws whose primary function is to legally protect the public. Since there are some variations in these laws between countries, the consulting professional shall abide by the government's professional regulation laws and honor the Code of Ethics of the profession in the country where the services are to be performed.

Article 10. (1) The common objectives of all professional organizations are to establish and promote the highest standards of ethical conduct and excellence in the practice of the professions, to regulate the professional conduct of members of the professions and to cooperate with their allied professional organizations. (2) In line with the foregoing objectives, it shall be mandatory upon a professional organization to take appropriate action on any formal complaint for unethical conduct filed against any member of its profession by a co-professional, a client, a professional organization or a government regardless of the residence of the complainant.



RESOLUTION NO. 1

The First Asian Congress of Architects representing thirteen professional organizations from the Asian countries which was held in Manila, Philippines on October 25-28, 1984, after deliberating on the role of the architects in the social, economic and technical development of all countries, particularly of developing countries and after reviewing the document entitled "International Code of Ethics on Consulting Services" which was framed and adopted by the Architects Regional Council Asia (ARCASIA) in 1981, found such Code as an essential instrument for use by all architects practicing within their countries or in foreign lands, in order to achieve the highest standard of ethical conduct and excellence in the practice of the profession and to attain the necessary scientific and technical cooperation and harmonious relationship among practicing architects, do hereby resolve to formally adopt the "International Code of Ethics on Consulting Services."

It is further resolved that the "International Code of Ethics on Consulting Services" be presented for ratification by the different associations represented in this Congress, for use by their own members and to present the said Code to the Union Internationale des Architectes (UIA) for final adoption by the UIA in the forthcoming assembly in January 1985 at Cairo, Egypt and for use by all member organizations of UIA.
