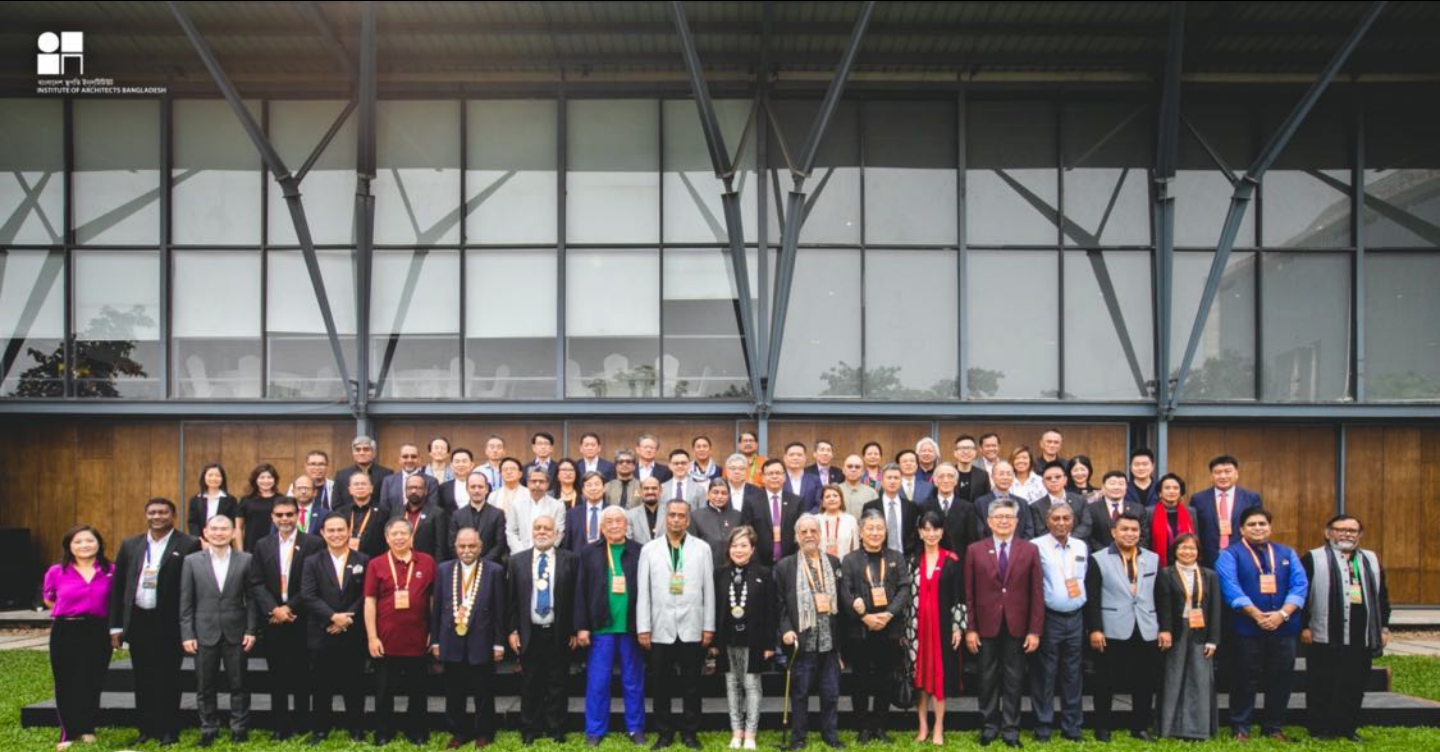

I speak about technology, because in 2001, I was approached by then-Chairman Zaigham to lead ARCASIA Web. The online presence of ARCASIA was thus born. Simultaneously, I had led, as President of the SIA (Singapore Institute of Architects), the transformation of the industry from analogue into digital – across design, statutory submissions and then education via the local schools of architecture. The same digital approach is taken for this book, which is to be released as an electronic copy, to accompany your mobile device as you work, commute, travel or simply as a reference source. This sets a template for our future communication too.

ARCASIA started 50 years ago out of the necessity to establish a unique Asian culture of architectural design, practice and education. It has since grown to now also include ACSR (ARCASIA Committee on Social Responsibility), another cause that I champion; ACGSA (ARCASIA Committee on Green and Sustainable Architecture) and ACYA (ARCASIA Committee on Young Architects), bringing the best and most active minds in Asian architecture together. On the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of ARCASIA, held in Dhaka and graciously hosted by the IAB (Institute of Architects Bangladesh), I'd like to take this opportunity to thank my predecessors and advisors for setting a solid foundation upon which we stand and operate. I thank my Office Bearers and Committee Chairs for championing the cause of ARCASIA through their own respective institutes as well as through the central ARCASIA council. And to the 21 ARCASIA member institutes, I thank you for your continued support. You make ARCASIA what it is.

In moving towards a technology-reliant architectural climate, let us not forget the human and environmental qualities. My manifesto for this term can be summarised with the acronym **SEEDS**: **S**ocial awareness and responsibility, **E**ducation and life-long learning, **E**nvironmental sustainability, **D**esign excellence and empathy, and **S**tewardship in use of all resources. I aim to grow these proverbial seeds into forests, creating a diverse, integrated ecosystem.

In my term, I would therefore like to focus on the following items, continuing on the good efforts of my predecessors:

- Increase focus on sustainable practice across nations, through cross-border collaborations
- Quicken the pace of preservation, conservation and adaptive reuse of Asia's diverse natural and built heritage
- Increase leverage on the use of IT (information technology), IoT (internet of things) and AI (artificial intelligence) to empower all architects in our role as stakeholders our environment.

Simultaneously, we continue addressing the concerns across Asia: rapid urbanisation with increasing population growth; increased impact of climate change, and the urgent need for mitigation measures thereof; and design for resilience. This has been sparked off with the inaugural Cross-Committees Dialogues / Roundtable on "Our Natural and Built Heritage" in Jaipur, 22-27 July 2019, the launch of the ARCASIA Emergency Architect (AEA), a CSR entity created to assist our members in the area of disaster relief efforts and the training of appropriate required expertise on 14 September 2019, as well as its concurrent ACSR Roundtable - a clarion call for action for design for resilience.

Through all the changes across the past 50 years, technological or otherwise, the spirit of ARCASIA has grown even stronger. In my term, I would like to see the pillars of technology, sustainability and social responsibility taken to even greater heights, as these are platforms that will universally resonate with us, and unite us.

We have been, and will continue to be, one Asian voice.

With the advice of Past Presidents Ar. George Kunihiro, Datuk Ar. Tan Pei Ing, Ar. Sathirut Nui Tandanand and Ar. Jahangir Khan, and of course Rita herself, we embarked on a compendium of accounts, notes, anecdotes and essays – valuably penned to share the exciting moments throughout the past 50 years of ARCASIA. Where the written word cannot replicate the sheer vibrancy, colour, seriousness and excitement experienced at an ARCASIA event, photographs were gracefully shared by the past Presidents as they recounted their years of service and leadership. These are accompanied with photographs of the Dhaka Forum 2019 and its festivities.

This book also took me back to where this all began – the lush Penang residence of Dato Seri Ar. Lim Chong Keat, founder of ARCASIA, who at one year shy of being a nonagenarian, still bears the same passion and fervour as he did those fifty years ago. Chong Keat sheds some light – and even more candour – on the early years, while offering his congratulations; as do six more esteemed gentlemen who have, over the course of the past half-century, sat on the hallowed chair of ARCASIA. They are joined by current Presidents of the ARCASIA member institutes, which now tally at 21, three-and-a-half-fold the original six; and three allied international organisations, offering their felicitations and sharing on the respective institutes' roles and engagements with their Asian brethren. We then turn our gaze to the future – best predicted by six young Architects who have had an intimate involvement in ARCASIA via ACYA – the ARCASIA Committee on Young Architects. They may, in their time to come, write their own ARCASIA histories.

The content is guided by a book design that draws from the warm orange hues of the ARCASIA logo, and numbered motifs that draw, in turn, from the elegant ARCASIA 50th Anniversary logo designed by hosts IAB – the Institute of Architects Bangladesh. In the spirit of sustainability, this publication finds its first life as an electronic publication, readable from your (ideally larger) mobile device. It can therefore be constantly refreshed, renewed and refurbished – very much like ARCASIA's own evolution over the past 50 years.

With deep sorrow, the Hong Kong Institute of Architects and the Architects Registration Board mourn the passing of Professor Barry F Will, who served as HKIA President from 1999 to 2000 and ARB Chairman from 1991 to 1992, on 29 August 2019 at Gleneagles Hong Kong Hospital. He is survived by his wife Dr Hwai Ping Sheng, son Ewen and daughter-in-law Jasie, and three grandchildren Layla, Blake and Riley.

Born in Australia on 14 May 1945, he attended the University of Queensland and graduated with a Bachelor of Architecture and Master of Urban Studies. In 1971, he came to Hong Kong on his appointment as Lecturer in the Department of Architecture, the University of Hong Kong, serving as Dean of the Faculty of Architecture from 1990 to 1998. While on sabbatical leave from HKU, between 1973 and 1988, he taught at a number of schools overseas: University of Edinburgh, UK, Rice University, University of Houston and Massachusetts Institute of Technology, USA, and Peihua Institute, Shenzhen, PRC, where he gained invaluable insight into architectural education worldwide, including outside of the British Commonwealth tradition.

1945-2019

Over the years, Barry was actively engaged in private practice as executive director of WCWP International Ltd. He continued to be closely involved in architectural education, as adjunct professor / honorary professor at the University of Hong Kong and external reviewer for the MArch programme at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. His long teaching career earned him great respect and admiration among the generations of Hong Kong architects who studied under him.

Shortly after his arrival in Hong Kong, he became active in the affairs of the then Hong Kong Society of Architects, was instrumental in reconstituting it as the present Hong Kong Institute of Architects in 1972 and played an important role in rewriting its constitution and rules. Later, he was a strong advocate in the campaign for legislation to protect the title of 'Architect' which culminated in the Architects Registration Ordinance of 1990.

His public duties included service as co-opted member of the Planning Development Conservation Committee of the Urban Renewal Authority, from 2001 to 2008 and as Chairman of the Authorized Person Registration Committee, from 2001 to 2003.

A charismatic, bearded figure, he is fondly remembered as an avid motorcyclist and sportsman in his younger days. In later years, he was often spotted speeding back and forth between Hong Kong Island and West Kowloon, where his office is located, in his iconic yellow Lotus Elise. Along with such an outgoing image, he was also a gentle, gregarious and engaging person, with a great sense of humour, and got on easily with colleagues and students who remained his life-long friends. His disarming laughter, heartwarming back-slapping and brilliant rhetoric gave him the irresistible advantage in accomplishing the most difficult and delicate tasks he was entrusted to.

Those who had the chance to work with him, whether at the universities, in his office or at the HKIA, will remember him as a man of prodigious memory, who could instantly recall details of events, personalities and organisational nuances with the utmost precision. He was literally a walking encyclopaedia, with wide international exposure, to whom everyone could feel confident in turning for help.

Outside of Hong Kong, he was a protagonist for international cooperation in the promotion of architectural excellence, having been Chairman of ARCASIA, 2003-2004, and having served ARCASIA in other capacities until this year, which equipped him with extensive knowledge of professional practice in countries of the Pacific Rim and beyond. With such experience he fostered better interaction between the Institute and countries in the region, and helped to launch it as a hub of international connectivity in the architectural field.

In his later years, he devoted time and resources to elevate the HKIA/ARB accreditation system to international standing, by revamping its rules and terms of reference to match the requirements of the Canberra Accord. That the Institute is now a signatory of the Accord owes much to his relentless efforts and guidance, particularly as a member of the HKIA/ARB Joint Taskforce. Under his leadership in chairing accreditation and revalidation visits to local tertiary institutions, from 2012 to 2017, he vindicated the reliability of the Institute's accreditation system through practical application and set an example to other accreditors.

In keeping with his strong will power and unfailing sense of duty, he never gave up, even after he fell ill. Until recently we still saw him at regular meetings, analysing problems and arguing with unequivocal clarity for open-mindedness in approaching new challenges. We will forever miss his charming smiles and selfless dedication. With heavy hearts, we offer our sincere condolences to members of his family and may our friend and mentor, Barry, rest in peace.

In hindsight, my term as the first “President” of ARCASIA, was a transition from the second generation to the third generation of “Chairmen” in the organisation.

The forefathers, back in the 1960s, organised the first Congress of Asian architects in a show of independence from the “Old World” network to their own Asia-rooted network of Architects Council of Asia, to be called ARCASIA. The organisation grew with new member institutes joining yearly until the colour of the “institutes of the “Former British Colony” was gradually transformed into a more assimilated Asia-wide contemporary organisation, when the ARCASIA welcomed institutes of East Asian countries. The Japan Institute of Architects (JIA) was admitted to ARCASIA in 1991, with the leadership of Ar. Koichi Nagashima, who was teaching in Singapore, and had a solid network with the architects of Southeast Asia.

By the time I first attended the ARCASIA Forum in 1997 held in Tokyo, ARCASIA had grown to be a true Forum of Asian Architects. Ten years later, I was elected Vice Chairman Zone C, under the leadership of Chairman Ar. Yolanda Reyes.



PRESIDENT, ARCASIA, 2011-2012

My two-year term, 2011-2012, coincided with the UIA World Congress held in Tokyo in September 2011. I had a vision to direct ARCASIA to look outward to the rest of the world. In my agenda, I called upon the members of ARCASIA to “activate and fully utilise the ARCASIA’s organisational potential; to establish a continuous channel to disseminate the information related to ARCASIA activities; and to initiate the establishment of the network of regional organisations in Asia. To make the vision clear, I coined a formula “The 4C + C = G”. It refers to “Communication, Contribution, Connection, Change plus Continuity equals ARCASIA Growth”. In the category of “Communication”, I set forth to establish the reorganisation of the communication network, redesign of the website, and reformatting of Architecture Asia magazine to include projects and news about the activities beyond the ARCASIA members, to position the AA magazine as more central and relevant in Asia Region. Setting up the Facebook page and a Twitter account were innovative moves at the time for an organisation like ARCASIA.

“Contribution” aimed to promote more active and continuous inputs by the member institutes to the activities of ARCASIA, at the time when the activities mainly centered around the annual Council Meetings.

“Connection” pointed to reaching out to other regional organisations such as the African Union of Architects, Architects Council of Europe and MASA. During my term in the office. ARCASIA successfully signed the MOUs with these organisations. The relationship with the American Institute of Architects continued with mutual attendance of the respective Presidents in the annual meeting of each organisation.

“Change” was an important keyword. During my term, ARCASIA initiated the change in the office of the presiding officer of ARCASIA from “Chairman” to “President”, to align with office of most of the international organisations. This change was, in hindsight, a daring move, since our past leaders and the members from the first and the second generations were attached to the familiar title of “Chairman” of the Council Meeting. In my thought “President” has the image of a leader to represent the interest and well-being of all architects who belong to our profession in Asia Region, and much beyond the Council Meeting.

Another renewal was the removal of “Permanent Advisor” from the Office Bearers. The Permanent Advisor was an important position with regards to knowledge of history of ARCASIA dating back to the founding of the organisation. In situations where the Council or the Chairman needed the precedents as reference in making decisions, having the Permanent Advisor was useful. However, in order for ARCASIA to stay current and look at the horizon for the future, it would be more logical to allow the Presidents to appoint up to two Advisors of his/her choice to give the leadership freedom to organise a team and to rotate the Advisors from term to term. These two changes in the Bylaws were major changes in the history of ARCASIA. Today, after five Presidents, I believe that the term has become familiar to all members of ARCASIA family and the healthy rotation of Advisors have been put in place.

“Continuity” calls for creation of harmonious work environment of the office bearers and the smooth transition to the incoming group of under the leadership of the incoming President. Between the term of Chairman Ar. Mubasshar Hussein, my predecessor, and my term, the “Handover Office Bearers’ Meeting” was created and it has become a tradition when the new President is handed all the records of the past two years in this ceremonial Office Bearers’ Meeting. The system is also functioning well today.

“Growth” for any organisation is an important challenge, especially when the organisation is to stay relevant and to expand influence in the region, as well as maintaining a close relationship with other global organisations. During my term as the President, I proposed a “Ten Year Growth Plan” to the Council and it was adopted in Danang in 2011. The objective of the Plan was “Growth in Size, Quality, Importance and Finance”. In 2010, there were 17 members in ARCASIA. Today in 2019, we have 21 members, showing a significant growth over the past seven years. The ARCASIA Award for Architecture has become an important and active award of excellence in architectural design in Asia Region. The significant effort by President Ar. Tan Pei Ing, in the subsequent years, has elevated the quality of what ARCASIA promotes in its activities.

In addition, the ARCASIA Committee for Social Responsibility (ACSR), the first new committee to be established in a number of years, was established in 2011. The committee discusses the importance of architects to get involved in the area of social responsibility respecting human rights, rights of the stakeholders, focusing on accessibility and universal design, climate and environmental change disaster relief, conservation and sustainable revitalisation of cultural heritage and other social responsibility-related agenda. In the 32nd Council Meeting held in Danang, the Council voted to establish a new committee given the mission to deal with Social Responsibility issues.

In Boracay, Philippines, during the UAP Architects' "Summit on Collaborative Action and Leadership" held in February 2012, ARCASIA launched the ARCASIA Committee for Social Responsibility (ACSR), chaired by Ar. Joseph Kwan, former Council Member of the UIA Region IV and the the past Chairman of the UIA Work Programme on Social Responsibility. Joseph is an expert in the field, and he has lead ACSR over the years and has shown positive results in multiple areas of the ACSR activities around the region. In the spirit of the "Growth", we now have the ARCASIA Committee on Young Architects (ACYA) to continue our tradition to expand the activities and improve the quality of services of ARCASIA.

During my term as the ARCASIA President, I put forth a vision for ARCASIA which aimed for the organisation to become influential in the world stage. I believe that open channels for dialogue related to all relevant issues affecting our profession in the global arena would be crucial in keeping up with the rapidly changing environment of our society and our profession. Successors in the proceeding years have been energetic in engaging ARCASIA in many issues including natural disasters, universal design, urban expansion, public policy and professional education.

ARCASIA was a signatory of the “Tangier Declaration” signed on 16 March, by the Presidents of the three regional organisations: AUA, Architects Council of Europe (ACE) and ARCASIA, and endorsed by the President of Pan American Federation of Architects Association (FAPAA). The Declaration “...call(s) on the UIA Council and the Vision and the Strategy Committee to strengthen and include the existing regional architectural organisations in the effective mutual cooperation... and commit to further develop multi- and bi-lateral cooperation between the regional organisations leading to innovative, inclusive and unison representation of the global architectural community.” Since the signing of this Declaration, the bond between the four organisations have become visibly strong, as it has become a tradition for the the Presidents or other dignitaries of these and other organisations to attend our ARCASIA Forum and Asian Congress of Architects.

In April 2012, I was invited by President Ar. Selma Harrington of Architects Council of Europe (ACE) to participate in the General Assembly of ACE in Amsterdam. On 27 April 2012, during the session of the Assembly, ACE and ARCASIA signed a MOU to officially launch a cooperative relationship between the two organisations. There was a meeting held between the UIA, AUA, ARCASIA, with the acknowledgement of ACE on 27 April in Hotel Mercure. Participating regional organisations will support the efforts of the UIA and will collaborate on many issues confronting our profession.

In addition, the AUA, ACE and ARCASIA had met in three separate occasions, in Tangier, Amsterdam and in Bali, ARCASIA had the honour to invite Presidents of our counterpart organisation to continue the dialog to built upon the relationship amongst the regional organisations.

Quality of Finance is an on-going challenge for ARCASIA, In the Ten Year Growth Plan, I proposed to remind the member institutes and my successors, that the healthy financial condition leads to expanded activities of our organisation, Again, Ar. Tan Pei Ing and Ar. Sathirut Nui Tandanand were successful in securing important sponsors to allow ARCASIA to set up new programmes to include more variety of interest groups in our profession.



PRESIDENT, ARCASIA, 2011-2012

During my two years in the office, I presided over the 32nd and 33rd Council Meetings which were held in Danang, Vietnam and Bali, Indonesia respectively. My challenge in presiding over the ARCASIA Council Meeting was to carry out my duty to manage the meeting in the fairest and most efficient way. I would like to put on record that I adjourned one of the two-day meetings in Danang by 3:30 pm, with all the items on the agenda discussed and voted on, when the schedule called for 5:00 pm adjournment.

On the festive side, I had the honour of presiding in the two memorable gatherings. The ARCASIA Forum 16, held in Danang, Vietnam, was organised by the Vietnam Association of Architects under Chairman Nguyen Tan Van, and attracted over 700 delegates. The main theme of the Forum, "Asian Cities in 21st Century", an appropriate theme for the Danang which is the third largest city in Vietnam with accelerating economy during the year of Forum 16.

The Forum opened with a keynote by Ar. Richard Hawkins, a Partner at Foster and Partners. The two-day Forum focused on the urbanisation, the trends in contemporary architecture and Architecture and Urban identity with speakers from around Asia to present, amongst others, papers, on urbanism in Bangladesh, green architecture in Vietnam, disaster risk reduction in Indonesia, experience on post-disaster recovery effort in the Great East Japan Earthquake in 2011.

Asian Congress of Architects (ACA) 15, held in Bali in October 2012, featured the Pritzker Prize Laureate Ar. Fumihiko Maki of Japan as a keynote speaker. Mr. Maki presented the evolution of Modernism in Japan featuring his work in the context of traditional Japanese culture. As a member of the Japan Institute of Architects, it was a refreshing to see Mr. Maki speaking before a full-house audience in Bali.

ACA's theme centered around Asian Cities & Urban Development, Architectural Design and Cross-border practice. Featured speakers included Li Xiaodong (China), Wong Mun Summ & Richard Hassell of WOHA (Singapore), Chan Soo Khian of SCDA (Singapore), Nguyen Quang Dat (Vietnam) and many other speakers on the three topics.

In ACA 16, ARCASIA hosted the first International President's Forum. Selma Harrington, President of Architects Council of Europe (ACE), Shelley Penn, President of Royal Australian Institute of Architects (RAIA), Albert Dubler, President of International Union of Architects (UIA), Tokumbo Omisore - President of (AUA), Adrey V. Bokov, President of International Association of Unions of Eurasia Architects (IAUEA), and Jeff Potter, President of the American Institute of Architects (AIA). Munichy B. Edrees, President of Ikatan Arsitek Indonesia (IAI), joined me in the discussions related to the various global issues facing our profession.

Personally, it was a challenging two years serving as the President of ARCASIA. At the end of the term, I confirmed that the vision and the strategy our Office Bearers worked on had been put to a working mode and the organisation began to follow the Ten-Year Plan. The result was seen in the success of the International Presidents' Forum where eight presidents from various international organisations, including the UIA, participated in a valuable exchange of ideas. As I write these last few words in this chapter, I see that ARCASIA, in its 50th year, is a strong and influential union of regional professional organisations, leading a number of important initiatives, and continues to reach out to make constructive dialogues with the rest of the world.

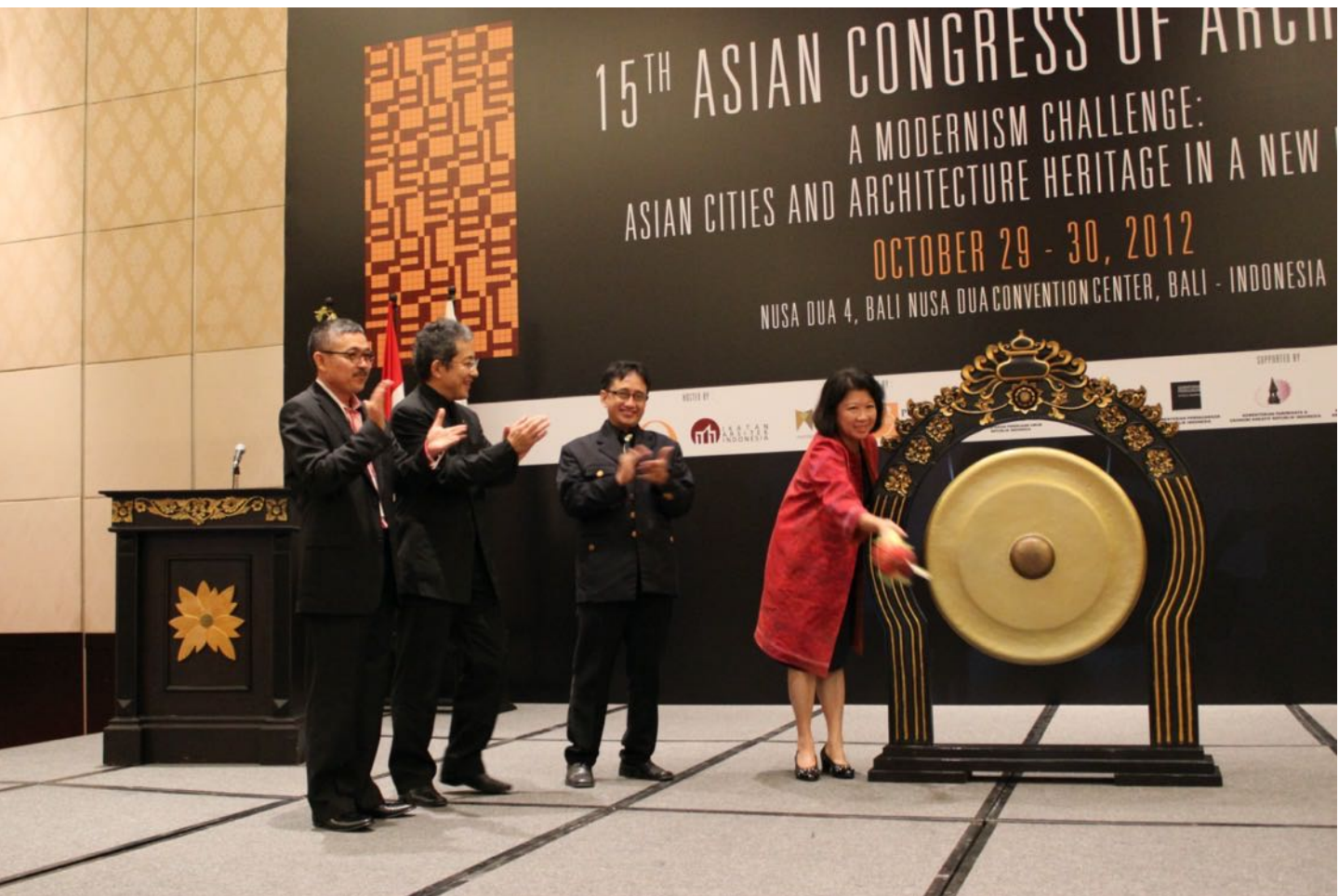

Pei Ing has been involved in ARCASIA since the 1990s. ARCASIA has become a very important part of her professional life and it has become akin to family. When she became President of PAM, she took a break from ARCASIA in early 2000s, but her passion for ARCASIA remained strong. In 2006, she decided to contribute to ARCASIA and to take on the challenge to revamp ARCASIA into a more visible and vibrant organisation. Hence, she started her more than a decade-long intensive involvement with ARCASIA. Pei Ing served as the Deputy Chairman for Zone B from 2007-2008 and was elected as the President-Elect in 2011 in Danang, Vietnam.

Vision & Mission For ARCASIA

Pei Ing’s vision during her ARCASIA Presidency was “to rejuvenate ARCASIA to meet the challenges of the new millennium”. Her mission was “to elevate ARCASIA as the premium organisation to represent all the Architectural Institutes of the Asian Region to propagate its ideals, aspirations and as a conduit to share knowledge and experiences for all its members”.

She has successfully revamped ARCASIA as one of the leading regional organisations, having achieved many key milestones and developed many new programmes such as the following:

- Advocacy on Social Responsibility & Inclusive Architecture
- Promotion of Design Excellence and Young Architects
- Disaster Management and Emergency Architects Framework
- Engagement with Regional and International Organisations
- Restructured ARCASIA and improved its governance
- Promotion of ARCASIA
- Outreach Programmes

Significant Programmes & Initiatives Under ARCASIA

Advocacy on Social Responsibility & Inclusive Architecture

She is very passionate about ‘Architecture for Humanity’ and is a strong advocate for socially responsible and inclusive architecture, and she made this as one of her key agenda items. She worked closely with the ACSR Committee and introduced the inaugural ‘ARCASIA Post Forum and Congress Events for Social Responsibility’ covering Disaster Preparedness, Post Disaster Management, Universal Design, Affordable housing, Cultural Heritage and Conservation, etc., both in Nepal in 2013 and Kuala Lumpur in 2014. This agenda has now been officially integrated into all future ARCASIA Congress and Forums. Design competitions, ‘Universal Design - Public Toilet for all’ and ‘The Making of Socially Responsible Designs Today, To Shape Communities to Be Responsible Citizens of Tomorrow’ were also conducted in 2013 and 2014 respectively to raise awareness on social responsibility and architecture for the community among the professionals and the students.

During her presidency, a Forum and the ARCASIA 1st Roundtable on Social Responsibility were also held in Islamabad, hosted by IAP in 2014, and the ARCASIA Resolution on Social Responsibility was formulated. The ARCASIA 1st Roundtable on Architectural Education was also held with the formulation of the ARCASIA Resolution on Architectural Education.

She initiated immediate action and a donation drive when Typhoon Haiyan struck Philippines on 2nd November 2013. Money collected including her personal donation was channeled to the United Architects of the Philippines (UAP) that was used for the construction of school as a pilot project by UAP. She was presented with Special Appreciation Plaque by UAP, in recognition of her contribution in 2017.

She was also instrumental in working with the Chairman of ACSR Joseph Kwan to push for the formulation of the ARCASIA Charter on Social Responsibility, including securing all the necessary financial sponsorship. The Charter was published and adopted by 19 member Institutes in 2015, to promote socially responsible architecture for a better built environment.

She recognised the vulnerability of the ARCASIA Member Institutes' Countries that are often struck by natural disasters, and action plans were prepared through the ACSR Committee to address pre- and post-disaster management. The framework was formulated to establish the ARCASIA Emergency Architects to coordinate future disaster preparedness and management and this has now become a reality in 2019 through the joint efforts of all the subsequent ARCASIA Presidents.

Pei Ing's commitment to this continues beyond her presidency and as Immediate Past President, she supported ARCASIA President Sathirut Nui Tandanand to assist Nepal when it was struck by an earthquake in 2015. She was also involved in the special ARCASIA Roundtable Summit organised in Islamabad, hosted by Institute of Pakistan for Post-Disaster Reconstruction in Nepal in 2015.



Improvement of Governance

Pei Ing instilled the principles of transparency and inclusiveness in all aspects during her ARCASIA presidency. She also improved the governance of ARCASIA as follows:

- Complete revamp of the ARCASIA website and launched a special ARCASIA documentary to promote ARCASIA.
- Reviewed, updated and streamlined the Constitution and Bylaws
- Developed various policies and guidelines, including the ARCASIA Corporate Identity Guidelines.
- Prepared the ARCASIA Handbook which serves as a proper reference document that provides clarity and continuity for future administration.
- Responsible in getting the ARCASIA History Book corrected and converted it to digital format to facilitate future updating.

Pei Ing also managed to improve the financial standing of ARCASIA and she secured substantial sponsorship and signed MOUs with 3 Corporate Partners, Sika Asia Pacific, Roca Malaysia and Geberit, to finance and promote all the programmes undertaken during her term, especially in the initiatives relating to social responsibility and promotion of design excellence in Asia. Through her assistance, one of the Corporate Partners, Sika, continued their commitment and sponsored events subsequent to her presidency.



Promotion of Design Excellence and Young Architects

Pei Ing recognised the importance of promoting architectural design excellence and talents. She revamped and rebranded the ARCASIA Awards for Architecture (AAA) to elevate it to a more prestigious award to promote the design excellence of the architects within the Asia region. It was changed from a bi-annual event to an annual event, and 2 new categories on Socially Responsible Architecture and Sustainability were introduced to promote green and inclusive architecture. A Formal Awards presentation is constituted to celebrate the winners. The shortlisted and winning entries are featured not only at the website, public media but also in the special edition under the Architecture Asia publication. AAA has gained great recognition and attracted tremendous participation.

Together with the editorial team of Architecture Asia, she also introduced the inaugural Architecture Asia Awards for Emerging Architecture (AAAEA) in 2014, as another initiative to promote younger design talents (i.e. below 45) and provide a tool for discourse for emerging architecture in Asia. The first one was organised in conjunction with ACA16 in Kuala Lumpur. The 2nd and 3rd were held in 2016 and 2019 respectively.

The new ARCASIA Committee for Young Architects (ACYA) was also formally established during her presidency during the 35th Council Meeting in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, to give a platform for the younger members to participate in ARCASIA.

Pei Ing also worked with the editorial team and rebranded ARCASIA's Official Journal, Architecture Asia (AA), published by PAM on behalf of ARCASIA to position it as an internationally-recognised magazine that will reflect the intrinsic quality of Asian architecture. It allows Asian Architects the rightful opportunity to explore and expound the virtues of Asian architecture globally. The e-copy of AA was also made more accessible online to increase readership. She has been serving as advisor for AA for many years.



Promotion of ARCASIA

Pei Ing was committed to promote ARCASIA to a much wider audience, to members of the Member Institutes, regionally and internationally.

She secured support from Building & Investment (B&I) Magazine to be ARCASIA's supporting magazine. More than 10,000 printed copies of the B&I magazine are being circulated to Malaysia and Southeast Asia and both the printed and e-versions command a readership of not less than 80,000.

In the January-February 2013 bi-monthly B&I magazine, the news on ARCASIA on the handing over and newly elected Office Bearers, the objectives of ARCASIA, and the upcoming Congress in Kuala Lumpur were promoted. B&I also published another special feature on ARCASIA in the July-August 2013 issue, and promoted the ACA 16 and related events throughout her 2 years' term. B&I also actively promoted the Post ACA Symposium on Social Responsibility through their network and contact.

Pei Ing revamped the ARCASIA website to attract more visits. She launched a special ARCASIA documentary to promote ARCASIA in events organised by Member Institutes, regional and international organisations. She was also instrumental in setting up an ARCASIA Booth in Durban during the UIA Congress 2014 to promote ARCASIA.

She also persuaded Smith Obayawat, Past President of ASA to assist to turn ARCASIA Hymn into an 'ARCASIA Anthem' to be played in all ARCASIA and related Events to promote the objective and spirit of ARCASIA.



Outreach Programmes

During Pei Ing's term as President, she worked closely with the respective Vice Presidents and actively liaised with the Institute of Architects within the Asian region to join ARCASIA as a Member Institute.

The Bhutan Institute of Architects (BIA) has officially joined ARCASIA as a Member Institute, effective from 2014. Communications were also established with:

- Association of Myanmar Architects (AMA)
- Cambodian Society of Architects (CSA)
- Pertubuhan Ukur Jurutera & Arkitek, Architect Division (PUJA AD) in Brunei Darussalam

Attempts were also made to reach out to Union of North Korean Architect. Continuous efforts were also made by the subsequent Presidents, and AMA and PUJA AD are now Member Institutes of ARCASIA.

One of Pei Ing's aims was to make ARCASIA more inclusive and relevant. She took great effort to reach out to not only to the Member Institutes, Past Chairmen, Fellowship Members but also to engage those who in the past, had contributed time and effort to ARCASIA and encouraged their further participation in ARCASIA activities. Regular updates on activities and news of ARCASIA were sent out to engage all these members regularly.

She also consciously participated many of the Member Institutes' events and also attended various ARCASIA Zone meetings to engage the Member Institutes and to understand their issues. She was presented with Honorary Member and President's Medal by KIRA in recognition of her effort.



Engagement With Regional and International Organisations

In addition to her vigorous efforts to reach out to the ARCASIA Member Institutes, Pei Ing also actively engaged and collaborated with other regional and international organisations such as UIA, ACE, AUA, VFA4, FPAA, AIA (American Institute of Architects), AIA (Australian Institute of Architects), etc. She renewed the MOUs with ACE and AUA in 2014. She also initiated collaboration with VFA4 and the Memorandum Of Understanding was signed between ARCASIA and V4AF in 2018. She was presented with a special Certificate of Appreciation by the President of V4AF in recognition of her effort and contribution towards collaboration. She represented ARCASIA in UIA, AIA (American Institute of Architects) and AIA (Australian Institute of Architects) events and she was also presented with AIA (American) Honorary Member and President's Medal.

Key Activities : ARCASIA Forum, Congress and Council Meetings

The following were the 2 major events held under Pei Ing's Presidency:

1. The ARCASIA 17th Forum with the theme 'Spirituality in Architecture - Architecture and the Image of the City', the 34th Council Meeting and the related events were held in Kathmandu, Nepal, hosted by SONA, from 4th-10th October 2013.
2. The ARCASIA 16th Congress of Architects (ACA16) with the theme 'RejuveNATION', the 35th Council Meeting and the related events were held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia hosted by PAM from 26th - 30th June 2014. The theme of ACA16 was mooted by PAM to support President Pei Ing's vision for ARCASIA.

Pei Ing was involved actively with both SONA and PAM on the organisation of these events, including getting sponsorship for the AAA Awards and the Social Responsibility Forums.



Office Bearers & Committees' Works

Pei Ing established clear KPIs (Key Performance Indices) for all the Office Bearers and Committee Chairs. She involved the Committee Chairs in all the regular meetings with the Office Bearer. The progress of the projects & programmes were reviewed and monitored closely and at the end of her presidency, most of the milestones set were successfully achieved.

Conclusion

It is beyond doubt that Pei Ing has successfully rejuvenated ARCASIA and elevated ARCASIA regionally and internationally during her term as President.

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Reflecting on my term as ARCASIA President during the year 2015-2016, those 2 years were the most rewarding of my professional career. With the great teamwork from our Vice Presidents Zone A, B and C, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer, as well as all the Committee Chairmen, we had two wonderful years of working closely together on projects for ARCASIA. I am also happy to say that we were able to achieve most of the projects we had set out to do at the beginning of our term.

First, I am very proud that ARCASIA Council had agreed with our proposal to established ARCASIA Young Architects Committee (ACYA). This was the start of many programmes during my term to rejuvenate ARCASIA and create a platform for young architects to network and interact within their group. First, I am very proud that ARCASIA Council had agreed with our proposal to established ARCASIA Young Architects Committee (ACYA). This was the start of many programmes during my term to rejuvenate ARCASIA and create a platform for young architects to network and interact within their group.



Through ACYA, we were able to initiate ARCASIA Travel Prize, a travel and research scholarship for architects below 40 years old. This programme enables the recipients to travel and do research in other countries within Asia. NS BlueScope (Thailand) was our benefactor for this scholarship. Three winners, one from Zone A, B, and C were selected from many entrees in the design idea competition. Since the inception, we have had 3 groups of Awardees travel and do research in Japan twice and Thailand once. Japan Institute of Architects (JIA) and the Association of Siamese Architects under Royal Patronage (ASA) played significant roles to help foster this programme for young architects.

We were also able to establish the ARCASIA Student Internship Program. This programme helped identify architecture students who wishes to do their internship away from their country and match them with architecture firms from other countries in Asia. For example, we had identified firms from Thailand and match them with students from Pakistan and Bangladesh as well as Thai students to train with firms in Japan and Korea. This programme is still on going and have become a part of ACAE activities. ARCASIA students are currently being trained in Thailand, Japan, and Korea.

Second, projects within ARCASIA Committee on Social Responsibility (ACSR). During my term, we had signed an MOU with Asian Disaster Preparedness Centre (ADPC) to assist ARCASIA with proper training in Disaster management and mitigation.

In May 2015, Nepal was struck with a catastrophic earthquake that destroyed many national treasures and monuments. Fortunately, the lost of lives were kept to a minimum. As part of the relief effort, I, along with ADPC, made a trip to Kathmandu to assist Society of Nepalese Architects (SONA) with immediate term and short term planning to map out strategies for management and mitigation as well as provide guidelines for post-earthquake reconstruction. All ARCASIA Member Institutes rallied to help raised funds to assist SONA in this post-earthquake reconstruction endeavor. Institute of Architects Pakistan (IAP) under the leadership of VP Zone A, Ar. Jahangir Khan helped organise a symposium on Nepal Post Earthquake Reconstruction as well as humanitarian relief efforts for our friends in Kathmandu.



Immediately after visiting Nepal, I attended the AIA (American Institute of Architects) National Convention in Atlanta, USA. During this trip, I presented the earthquake report and met with AIA current and past Presidents for additional fund raising to assist the post-earthquake relief and reconstruction. This was a great success. AIA was able to raise an additional 2.5 million USD through the Clinton Foundation and Architecture for Humanity organisation.

Third, on promoting ARCASIA to other organisations, the 2015-16 OB and Committee Chairs developed a promotion video with production assistance provided by Institute of Architects Bangladesh (IAB). The ARCASIA Video was displayed at the AIA National Convention in Atlanta 2015 as well as New York 2018. The ARCASIA Video was also displayed at a number of National Conventions of member countries.

ARCASIA is a wonderful organisation. This is the only organisation I know that camaraderie and friendship can transcend race, religion, social and political divide and come together for the sole purpose of improving our beloved profession. The spirit and energy from all involved in our activities have propelled this organisation to achieve greater successes in the international stage. It is no wonder why ARCASIA is known as the most vibrant and active architecture regional organisation in the world. With that, I wish to express my most heartfelt gratitude to have served as ARCASIA President for the years 2015-2016. "Long Live the spirit of ARCASIA".

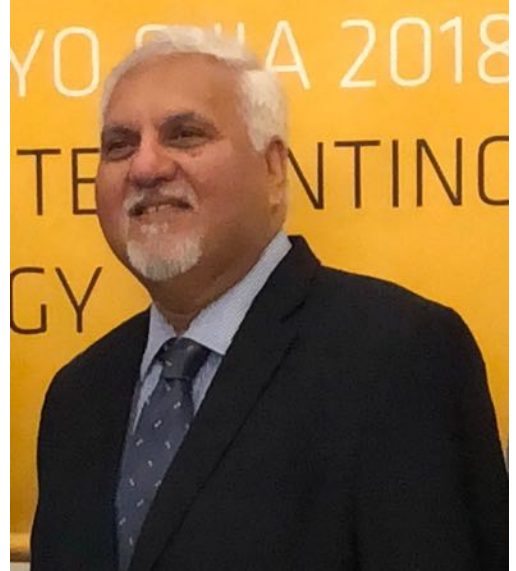








AR. S. M. JAHANGIR KHAN



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To have served as a President of ARCASIA has been an honour and a privilege that has been an absolutely serendipitous experience. Year 1

The ARCASIA 2017 year started on 14th January 2017, with our Office Bearers meeting in Islamabad where President Ar. Sathirut Nui Tandanand handed over the ARCASIA Presidency to me. While giving me the Chain of Office, he whispered a piece of advice to me. He said, "learn to say NO", and the next 8 months became a flurry of activity and travel all over the globe for ARCASIA and ARCASIA-related activities, resulting from our agenda of ARCASIA - reaching out to other regions, to share knowledge and vision for the betterment of us all.

An invitation from our dear friend President Ar. Harsha Fernando from SLIA Sri Lankan Institute of Architects to their annual Architectural Events followed in February 2017, where I was fortunate enough to meet and hear the world-famous Architect Moshe Safdie talk about his ongoing projects and his twin towers under construction in Colombo, amongst many others. The URBANISM discussion and resulting dialogue that followed in this event led to Incoming President Ar. Daya Hemantha Wijewardene expressing his interest to host the ARCASIA Training on Urbanism in February 2018 for Young Teachers and Architects from ARCASIA Institutes. Sadly, this was the last that I met Harsha before his untimely demise (may his soul rest in peace!).

The ACGSA Roundtable on Green and Sustainable Architecture in Bangkok was soon to follow on 24th February 2017, and we are grateful to President Ajaphol Dusitnanond that it was hosted by ASA at the Chatrium Hotel in Bangkok. This was followed soon after by our next OB meeting in Singapore on 17th March 2017, for which we are grateful to SIA for their hosting the meeting in Singapore. We had invited IIA President Ar. Divya Kush to be able to discuss the ARCASIA FORUM 19 preparations and issues in Jaipur since there was a problem with visas to visit the host country.

In April 2017, the Jury for AAA-ARCASIA Award for Architecture was held in Kathmandu to be able to accommodate President ARCASIA to also attend as required, in lieu of Jaipur due to visa issues. An amazing quality of entries made the job of the jury even more challenging. We were able to invite international jurors like Ar. Hyder Ali from Sudan, Ar. Yolanda Reyes from Philippines and Famous Indian art and movie persona Amol Palekar, apart from IIA President Ar. Divya Kush and his wonderful team, and myself.

It was a conversation on building a virtual knowledge bridge between Asia and Europe that led to a breakfast meeting in Hong Kong last year between ACE President Lucianno Lazzari and 6 or 7 of us from ARCASIA. This resulted not only in an invitation from ACE President to attend their Council meeting in May 2017, but also that it will be followed up by a full day European Association of Architectural Education event where I could present the ARCASIA vision to the European Architectural Education Fraternity in the Casa Dell'architettura in Rome. I was able to present our ARCASIA vision of collaboration and mutual cooperation in areas of Architectural Education, Heritage, Green and Sustainability, Professional Practice, CPD and Social Responsibility which was very well received by all present both at the Architects Council Europe and the EAAE. Many expressed their interest to reach out and join in such collaborative endeavours. This event and talk led to an ARCASIA collaborative education training event on Distance Learning opportunities in Rome the following year.

On my way back from Rome I used the opportunity to meet President V4AF Visegrad 4 Architectural Foundation Ar. Erno Kalman in Budapest, to explore the proposed MOU between ARCASIA and V4AF. Our positive discussions led to exploring a joint ARCASIA+V4AF Symposium and Roundtable on HERITAGE: Adaptive Reuse of Heritage Structures. This Roundtable was planned and agreed upon to be undertaken jointly and took place almost 4-5 weeks later. The 19th ARCASIA FORUM took place on the 21st -26th May 2017 in the beautiful city of Jaipur in Northern India.

Unfortunately, the 6-month long outstanding visa issues remained unresolved and since no visas were issued, there were no delegates from IAP, nor the three of us ARCASIA Office Bearers Hon. Secretary ARCASIA Ramiz Baig, Hon. Treasurer Sannah Ejaz, and myself. The ARCASIA Council meeting was decided to be moved from India and was held in Kathmandu, Nepal, later in the same year.

The joint ARCASIA + V4AF Symposium and Roundtable on HERITAGE: Adaptive Reuse of Heritage Structures took place on the 1st of July 2017 at the Klebelsberg Kastély, Buda, Budapest. It was a well-attended Symposium and Roundtable with delegates from 10 ARCASIA (Asian) Countries and 3 of the 4 European Institutes were represented by their Presidents. The Hungarian Government supported the event by sending two representatives that participated as well. The successful Roundtable led to a Jointly signed Resolution between ARCASIA and V4AF. The much encouraged V4AF has invited ARCASIA to hold further such joint events together in mutual areas of interest.

A meeting with the President of the Association of Hungarian Architects (AHA) Mr. Andras Krizsan took place in Budapest with Hon. Secretary Ramiz Baig and myself, where the AHA President was also very keen to undertake joint events with ARCASIA and suggested to start with sending an International exhibition to ARCASIA Institutes and vice versa.

Right after our Roundtable in Hungary, I went to RIBA London as honoured by the President RIBA Ar. Jane Duncan to receive the RIBA Presidential Medal at an impressive ceremony at the Royal Institute of British Architects in London. This was followed by a 'Election Court' Livery Dinner Jointly Hosted by the worshipful company of Chartered Architects at the RIBA. On the sidelines of the RIBA events, President RIBA convened an International Presidents Breakfast Meeting which was most useful to attempt a synergy in our various International Organisations' efforts towards attempting to meet the MDGs Millennium Development Goals as a profession. The AIA American Institute of Architects also honored me with an Honorary AIA Membership and The American Institute of Architects Presidential Medal that was received on my behalf by ARCASIA Past President Ar. Tan Pei Ing in Orlando, USA, for which I am very grateful to her and Ar. Rita Soh, who were both my guests invited to accompany me by AIA.

This was closely followed by ACAE holding the ARCASIA Roundtable on Architectural Education in Yogyakarta, Indonesia on 17th July 2017, that was held right after the ACAE Architectural Studio Teacher Training by ARCASIA Vice President Zone-C and Master Teacher Trainer Ar. Nuno Soares. We are grateful to President Ar. Ahmed Djuhara of IAI (Institute of Architects Indonesia) and his amazing team of young professionals for the amazing hospitality during our short visit to Indonesia.

We left for our OB Meeting in Kuala Lumpur the day after arriving just in time for the opening ceremony of PAM's beautiful new building. I am extremely grateful to the kind and gracious honour shown to me by PAM President Ar. Ezumi Harzani Ismail during the inauguration of their building by the Selangor ruler Sultan Sharafuddin Idris Shah, who not only accepted an ARCASIA memento from me but also very graciously signed the PAM Building souvenir for me. It was a big honour to be invited to dine with His Highness for me, as well as for Ar. Rita Soh who was there.

Our successful Office Bearers Meeting was in parallel to the PAM Kuala Lumpur Architectural Festival at KLCC Malaysia. IAI President Ar. Ahmad Djuhara was our invited guest in our OB meeting.

We went to the UIA 2017 Congress in Seoul, South Korea, from 3rd to 10th September 2017. Architects Regional Council Asia, ARCASIA, was a visible presence during the congress due to the successful staging of a seminar jointly hosted with the Architects Council Europe (ACE): "A look into the future of education from Asian and European perspectives". This was another instance of ARCASIA's recent initiative towards cross regional cooperation.

The seminar was chaired by myself and President ACE, Lucianno Lazzari. The event was moderated by Hon. Secretary Ramiz. Notable speakers along with the chairmen included, President UIA - Ar. Esa Muhammad, Livio Sacchi from CNAPPC, Arturo Lavalle and Valina Geropanta from Guglielmo Marconi University Italy, Ar. Nuno Soares - ARCASIA Vice President Zone C and Ar. Mikako Oshima representing Arcasia Committee on Young Architects. ARCASIA also had a booth display in the exhibition hall showcasing ARCASIA Award for Architecture winning entries as well as ARCASIA promotional video and materials.

Our Focus this first year was on ARCASIA reaching outwards to other zones of the world interactively in the areas of architectural education, teacher training, urbanism, heritage, social responsibility, professional practice, cross-border practice and many others, as we see appropriate for collaboration. Our Committee for Young Architects, led by SIA's Ar. Tan Szue Hann, was also asked to be involved in all of these to hone ARCASIA leadership for the next generation in all areas.

Year 2

After a reasonably busy schedule of ARCASIA events till the UIA in Seoul Korea September 2017, we had a month to prepare for our 4th OB Meeting on November 2nd 2017 in Kathmandu, Nepal. This was held alongside the 38th ARCASIA Council Meeting on November 3rd and 4th. The 38th ARCASIA Council meeting was held in Nepal since it couldn't be held during the Jaipur congress, due to aforementioned visa issues. IIA President and his young and extremely enthusiastic IIA team more than made up for it by the good arrangements in Kathmandu, Nepal. We are very grateful to the Society of Nepalese Architects for their cooperation for making this happen in the best possible way. We had full representation from all member institutes except Mongolia.

The Council elected Ar. Rita Soh as our President-Elect from SIA. Elections also took place for the positions of Committee Chairpersons electing Ar. Gyanendra Singh Shekhawat from IIA as ACAE Chairman, Ar. Dilip Chandra Chatterjee from IIA as ACPP Chairman, Ar. Acharawan Chutarat from ASA as Chairperson ACGSA, Ar. Russell Dandeniya of SLIA as Chairman ACSR and Ar. Ahmad Ridha Abdul Razak of PAM was elected Chairman ACYA. I congratulated our President Elect Ar. Rita Soh and all the elected Committee Chairpersons. An ARCASIA Heritage Program was agreed upon to be hosted next council meeting. Congratulations are due to IAB for successfully securing the next ARCASIA Forum in Dhaka.

This was followed by the very well attended and conducted ACYA ARCASIA Committee of Young Architects 'Stormathon' in Chiang Mai, Thailand. It was extremely well structured due to the combined efforts of ACYA Chairman Ar. Tan Szue Hann and Deputy Chair Ar. Ridha. I am also grateful to ASA President Ajaphol for his support to this event.

We were hosted by the ASC and the Tongji University in Shanghai for our 5th OB Office Bearers Meeting in Shanghai. We are grateful to them for their kind support and amazing hospitality to all of us while we were there in China for 3 days. The OB meeting and visit to Shanghai was from 18th-20th January 2018.

The ARCASIA Committee on Professional Practice held a successful Professional Practice Forum with IIA in Kolkata, India, from February 9th-11th 2018. This was followed by the 2nd ARCASIA International Teacher Training Workshop on URBANISM in Colombo, Sri Lanka 12th-22nd February 2018. The week-long workshop was well attended by young teachers from 6 countries and conducted by South Africa based Italian Professor Fabio Todeschini. Professor Todeschini had earlier conducted a similar two week long International ARCASIA workshop in Islamabad, Pakistan. It saddens me to inform everyone that he has recently passed away in his sleep and ARCASIA has lost a very dear friend (may he rest in peace).

The ARCASIA Committee on Social Responsibility held a roundtable in Colombo, Sri Lanka on 23rd February 2018. I am very grateful to SLIA and President D.H. Wijewardene of SLIA for hosting this and our URBANISM Teacher Training graciously alongside their SLIA Annual Events where he introduced us to the Honorable President of Sri Lanka as well.

We had the 6th ARCASIA OB Office Bearers meeting in Tokyo 28th-30th March 2018, and are grateful to JIA President Masaharu Rokushika for his kind hospitality. Ar. Sumito Takashina and his team briefed the OB on the preparations for ACA from 10th to 15th September 2018. He was assisted by Masako Yasuda and Kay Miyashita and we are grateful to all of them for their hard work to make the ACA a success. We were also given a tour of both campuses of Meiji University where both the ACA and the Students Jamboree will take place. We had a short introduction to the Meiji University President who we thanked for letting us use the amazing facilities of both his campuses for our event.

On my way back from Japan, I joined the ARCASIA-ADPC Post-Disaster Emergency Training in Yogyakarta, Indonesia, that took place from 5th-9th April 2018. I am much grateful to Bill Ho of ADPC Asian Disaster Preparedness Center in Bangkok and his team of trainers that collaborated with us to train Architects from Indonesia and other ARCASIA Institutes. This was the first of such initial trainings and will be followed up by the training of trainers in all 3 ARCASIA Zones helping create trained necessary human resource for the AEA (ARCASIA Emergency Architects) that is in the final process of being formed in Hong Kong.

This event in Indonesia was followed by the ACGSA Roundtable at Semarang, Indonesia, from 7th-9th April 2018 which concluded successfully with a signed resolution. The ACPP Roundtable followed this in Bandung, Indonesia, followed by the ACPP-IAI Professional Practice Forum 9-11th April 2018. I am very grateful to and impressed by IAI President Djuhara and his amazing team's organisation of all these events spread in 3 cities and zones of Indonesia.

The ARCASIA+V4AF events continued from April 23rd-30th 2018 including MOU Signing Formally in Budapest Castle, then Visit to Bratislava Castle and meeting with the Slovakian Institute President in Bratislava. We continued to Prague, Czech Republic, where we visited the Castle and were invited to attend the INSPIRELLI Awards Ceremony at the Technical University Campus on 27th April 2018, followed by our ARCASIA+ V4AF HERITAGE Roundtable II the next day in Prague. The Roundtable was conducted in an informal setting but very well attended from both sides, and led to a signed resolution by all attendees. The last leg of this visit took us to Krakow in Poland where we visited the Castle there. On the way to Krakow we had a serendipitous opportunity for a short stop in Brno, Czech Republic to visit Mies Van Der Rohe's Villa Tugendhat that everyone enjoyed.

The AIA Australian Institute of Architects invited me as President ARCASIA to attend their National Conference and event at Gold Coast Australia. They very graciously surprised me with an Honorary Membership to the Australian Institute of Architects. I thank the Australian Institute of Architects President and Past President Richard Kirk for their kind and gracious hospitality.

The AIA American Institute of Architects very kindly Invited me and two guests for the AIA National Conference in New York from 20th-23rd June 2018. I requested Past President and Advisor Datuk Tan Pei Ing and our ARCASIA President Elect Rita Soh to represent ARCASIA at AIA. I am very grateful to AIA for the kind and gracious hospitality extended to all three ARCASIA representatives at their event.

The AAA (ARCASIA Awards for Architecture) Final Jury took place in Tokyo on 30th June 2018. I am extremely grateful to Past President George Kunihiro and also to Ms. Kay Miyashita and Ms. Masako Yasuda for all the hard work that went into organising this Jury meeting to decide the AAA Award winners in Tokyo. I am also very grateful to the AAA Jury members for making time and care in their diligent and careful judging of the AAA awards.

The ARCASIA 7th OB Meeting was held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, hosted by PAM on July 5th 2018. They also very kindly hosted the ACAE ARCASIA Committee on Architectural Education where due to the absence of ACAE Chairman John Joseph it was VP ARCASIA Zone C and Past ACAE Chairman Ar. Nuno Soares who stepped up on the President's request, and presented the various projects of ACAE. The initiative of Pilot Project of 2nd Year Architecture Studio Teacher Exchange was explained by the President ARCASIA that would be attempted concurrently as ACAE agreed to go ahead and deliberate till they met again in Japan to establish its TORs for further follow up of this exchange, both within ARCASIA and also with other zones of the world. This Exchange aims to be a vessel of learning and experiencing for both teachers to see how another university teaches the same subject as well as a cultural immersion and create inter university relationships as well across zones. I am pleased to add that as the pilot teacher exchange project is in various stages of progress successfully with many international schools one programme between Tongji University Shanghai China and COMSATS university Islamabad and Lahore that has since led to a successful teacher exchange, as well as Students Interaction in Shanghai and a signing of MOU for a Mutual cooperation for an Architectural Masters degree programme.

The very successful ACA-18 in Tokyo Japan took place on 10th-14th September 2018 at both the Meiji University campuses. For the 39th ARCASIA Council meeting which is an integral part of the ACA18 as well as the highlight of our calendar year, we had participation from 20 out of the 21 member countries, making it a very successful and fruitful meeting.

ASC invited me to represent ARCASIA to be part of a President's Roundtable alongside their URBANISM Workshop in Zhengzhou China from 18th-21st September 2018.

ARCASIA + Marco Polo University Rome held a very successful E-Learning Workshop in Rome Italy from 8th-12th September 2018. After this a very well attended International ARCASIA + V4AF Heritage Roundtable III took place on 26th-28th October 2018 in Lahore Pakistan. Thereafter, there was a follow-up on our ARCASIA-ADPC Post-Disaster International Training of Trainers in Islamabad Pakistan on November 2018.

We had started an ARCASIA URBANISM Dialogue on "Mega Cities: Intersections and Diversions. An Asian-African Dialogue" as discussed earlier starting with Cairo in January 2019, The first one of these at Cairo was hosted by the American University of Cairo ARCASIA+AUA URBANISM Roundtable on 8th January 2019. ARCASIA Institutes will bring their Urbanism narrative to discuss with AUA's African and ACE's & RIBA's European Narrative on Urbanism to begin this Roundtable dialogue. However this got delayed due to visa issues to first week of February 2019, after my presidential handover end January 2019 to President Ar. Rita Soh. President Soh very kindly and graciously asked me to continue working on this initiative with her and we have since had, after Cairo, the "Capital Cities: New Cities/Visionary Masterplans" in Islamabad in August 2019, and the third one one planned in Shanghai in 2020.

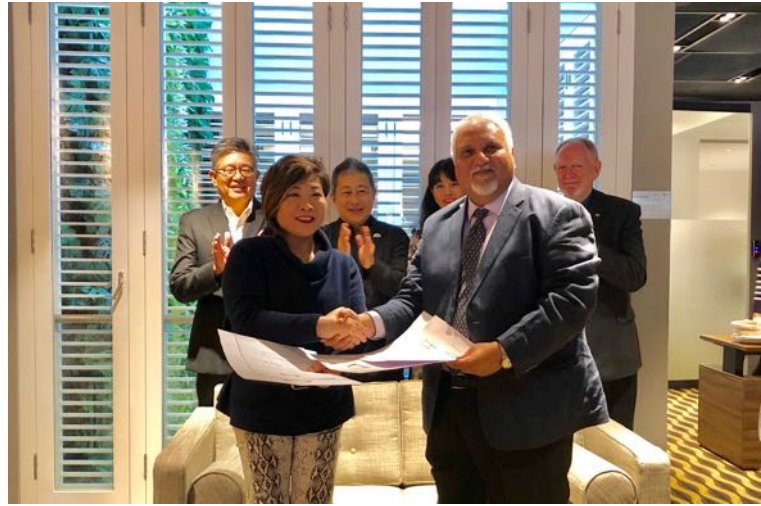








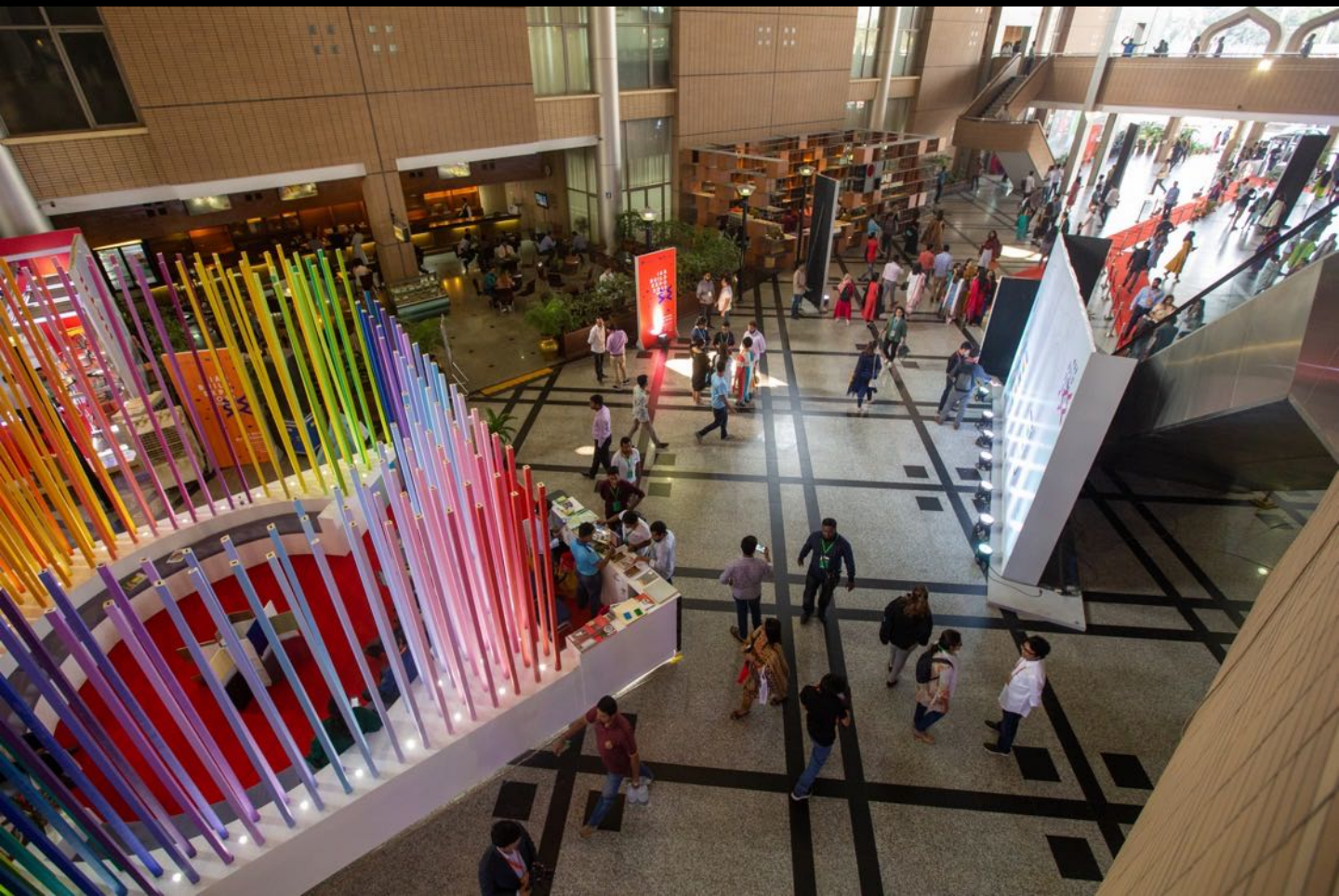

CONGRATULATORY MESSAGES FROM
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AR. SATHIRUT NUI TANDANAND

DATUK SERI AR. LIM CHONG KEAT

It must be an act of Providence that I am still around to respond to the invitation to write a message upon the 50th year since ARCASIA was initiated; I was then naively only 39 years old. Coincidentally, I had been persuaded to get down to memoirs about my earlier involvements with professional affairs in the SIA and the CAA since 1963 and especially the Asian Regional group, which led to the inception of ARCASIA in 1969 - with the dedicated collaboration of contemporaries in SIA and the other regional institutes, notably Kington Loo from PAM (earlier FMSA). Our mission then was to establish the integrity and relevant standards for each national body in a true Commonwealth (plus ASEAN) alliance - free from reactionary (imperialistic?) practices. Although we may have "Asiexited" from CAA, there are many lessons from the past to be revisited.

I was the chairman of the CBAE (Commonwealth Board of Architectural Education) from 1977 to 1981, a controversial period of the CAA to be recounted. I may have other memories about ARCASIA and its genesis, and happenings up to 1995 to revisit in a fuller account. Indeed the history of ARCASIA needed more adequate research as previous publications have not been quite accurate.



FIRST FOUNDING CHAIRMAN OF ARCASIA 1969-73

While international organisations may have interesting activities, the critical challenges remain for each national body to review its status and role to be relevant in the context of bad buildings and unbridled commercialisation and extravagance in urbanisation, where the deteriorating socio-economic environment worsens. Have we forgotten about slums and ugly precincts in almost all cities? And what about education where some schools are indulging in dream cut-and-paste worlds quite divorced from reality and often derivative in fashionable gimmickry and branded “Starchitecture”. What has happened to the ABAE (ARCASIA Board for Architectural Education)?

If my candid prognosis is shared, perhaps ARCASIA could consider addressing the worst in so-called Architecture and Planning (and development control) rather than only the “best”. Also to ensure that each institute is free from bickering cliques that may reflect the sad state of political machinations in some countries. Perhaps here I may have produced an unpalatable message, but I believe there is a growing awareness of the serious problems facing the profession in many countries. The real mission and relevance for ARCASIA would be to contribute to the solutions and to cooperate meaningfully.

For the celebratory gathering in Dhaka I note the amazing panoply of events which indicate the positive energies available, and as guest I send my felicitations, and personal thanks to our Bangladesh hosts.

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On the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of ARCASIA, I would like to recall part of my Opening Speech to the 3rd ARCASIA Forum meeting in Colombo, Sri Lanka in 1982.

“As I was walking down the never-ending airport corridor in Hong Kong at 7 a.m. last Wednesday to board the plane for this meeting, I started to think aloud about why architects like us leave our families and work behind to attend this sort of meetings halfway round the world and maintain honorary positions in international professional institutions such as ours. Surely to many people and our wives in particular, this sort of pursuit in the abstract world of international cross-fertilisation, regional professionalism etc. is bordering on insanity and yet many of us are addicted to be involved in such pursuits. Though, I must admit, it is rather an acquired taste; very much the same as being addicted to the durian fruit, I suppose. Incidentally, I am not particularly fond of the fruit, but I was told that once you like it, you cannot do without it and when you eat it, you are either envied by those who like it or not appreciated by those who don't. Either way, you lose.

Nevertheless, we keep on hearing the same old names being mentioned in the ARCASIA circle, such as Arunwongse, Loo, Albakri, Lim, Sim, Hong, Selvaratnam, Prescott, Adithiya, Bhalla, Prawirohardjo, Sudin, Lai, Szeto, Mendoza, Tiotuyco, etc. The fact that their names keep on reappearing can only confirm that the philosophy and work of ARCASIA is worthy of their continuous pursuit and association, not to mention that without fail all these men (and I regret not yet a woman though Mrs. Lari of Pakistan nearly made it to our Hong Kong meeting last year) are also highly successful in their profession. This fact alone will put to shame the constant challenges and ridicule that we receive from amongst our local institute membership that involvement in ARCASIA or all other international bodies is a waste of time and effort.

All of us can survive, of course, on just rice and water. In our part of the world, we call this combination plain congee, but sooner or later you would need a little spice, a drop of French Maggie or Worcester sauce, or even a piece or two of beef and so on. As modern design philosophy continues to be evolved and as modern technology advances in ever increasing scale and complexity and as foreign consultants keep on coming, we need the spices and meat of our profession i.e. the international cross-fertilisation to keep us properly fed to face the challenges of our profession.”

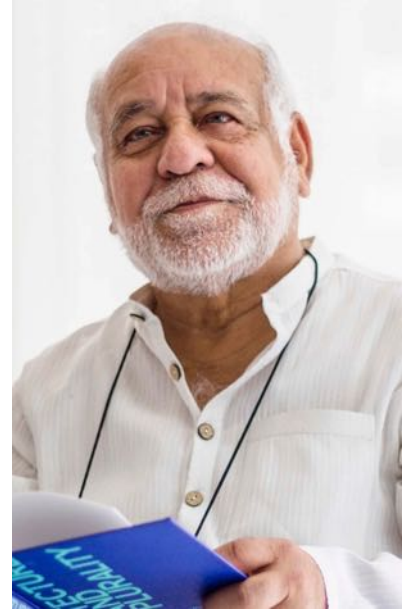
I have attended all ARCASIA meetings since 1979 and I shall hope to do so in November this year. It would be my 30th time.

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Congratulations ARCASIA!



In cricket parlance, ARCASIA has played a solid innings and remains unbeaten at 50! Well done ARCASIA!

The game of cricket was first played in Britain in the late 1800s, and over the next century, it was gradually exported to all its colonies across the oceans, the natives having enthusiastically embraced the game's finer points and adopted the strange terminology that goes with it. Field positions designated as "silly mid-off", "silly mid-on", "slip", "third man", "square leg", "fine leg", "extra cover", "mid-on" and "forward short leg" may sound bizarre to one not familiar with the game, but have been very much part of the vocabulary of the Brits and the colonised natives.

The Commonwealth of Nations comprising Great Britain and all its former Colonies was formed under the Royal Patronage of the British Monarch after most of these countries were granted independence in the years following the end of the Second World War. A conglomerate of newly independent nations spread over five continents, the only common thread that tied these countries was the legacy of colonialism and the fact that all spoke English and all played cricket!

After the founding of the Commonwealth Association of Architects (CAA) it soon became clear that the extreme diversity of history, ethnicity and culture represented by the members did not help, but on the contrary, was more of a hindrance in achieving the objectives of the Association. Soon enough, in 1967, architects from six CAA member countries from Asia, i.e. Hong Kong, Singapore, Malaysia, Sri Lanka, India and Pakistan, got together to discuss the possibility of forming their own association. After two years of deliberations (that usually took place on the sidelines of the CAA meetings) the first formative meeting of ARCASIA took place in 1969 and eleven years later ARCASIA held its first Council Meeting in Bangkok in 1980. By this time, the Philippines, Thailand, Bangladesh and Indonesia had formally joined ARCASIA. The first ARCASIA Board of Architectural Education (ABAE) was also constituted at this meeting. (ABAE was subsequently renamed ARCASIA Committee for Architectural Education (ACAE).)

Today, 39 years after the first formal Council Meeting, one can look back with great satisfaction and pride at how ARCASIA has matured over the years to become the world's most active, dynamic and reputable regional organisation of architects. I salute the Founding Fathers, particularly the two Founding Chairmen Lim Chong Keat of Singapore and Kington Loo of Malaysia, who had laid a very strong foundation for the succeeding Chairmen/Presidents to build upon.

What has truly sustained ARCASIA through the years has been the consistent, strong bond of friendship and empathy amongst its members, a willingness in all to share information and ideas, a deep concern for the well-being and welfare of fellow members, and, the warmest hospitality and care each member-institute offers when hosting events. This is THE ASIAN SPIRIT!

But caution has to be in place to avoid environmental degradation and poor settlements. Given that the world is moving towards urbanisation rapidly, architects have to be proactive and innovative to formulate new urban solutions. From the current 55%, it is estimated that more than 68% of the world's population is going to live in cities by 2050, and this will creep up to 85% by the turn of the century. It is incumbent upon us to develop creative and technological solutions for our survival in the future. Innovative designs inspire and contribute to the well-being of the end users. Conversely, insensitive designs will give rise to adverse environmental and community impacts that threaten our future.

ARCASIA, apart from promoting the arts and sciences of architecture, has been active in engaging the communities to formulate solutions on responsible architecture with greater humanistic emphasis. Its active engagement with students and young architects since its beginning is lauded to pave innovative directions of the profession for the future. These contributions by ARCASIA have been noticed and I believe our national governments welcome them too. It is in a good position to influence the policy makers to develop better cities, buildings and environment.

I am also pleased to note the strong cooperation between ARCASIA with other international organisations and particularly the International Union of Architects (UIA). The openness of ARCASIA to share its members' knowledge and experience among the world's fraternities shall certainly enrich its members and architects globally.

The Profession of Architects has been represented in Malaysia for almost 100 years and we will be celebrating our centenary in 2020 next year. ARCASIA V4AF collaboration

The Visegrad 4 Architectural Cooperation Organization was founded by the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland and Slovakia in 2008 by the Central European regional organisation to showcase examples of large villas and sacred exhibits that are parallel to Asian masterpieces, such as the buildings of László Hudec in Shanghai. The purpose of the series of planned events is to highlight these parallels. To this end, the founders of Visegrad 4 Architectural Cooperation are establishing the Visegrad 4 Architectural Foundation (V4AF) with the support of the International Visegrad Fund.

I have been meeting with ARCASIA representatives since 2008, Pei Ing Tan, and since 2009 we have been working with the UIA Vision and Strategic Planning Committee.

The future of the architectural profession is based on regional cooperation. This requires an understanding of the issues and issues facing the profession. We need to work together and develop strategies and action plans to address issues through consultation to strengthen the profession.



During the term of the President and former President of ARCASIA, we worked with Ar. Tan Pei Ing, Ar. Sathirut Nui Tandanand and Ar. Jahangir Khan, and now Ar. Rita Soh to develop mutual understanding to achieve common goals in the built environment. Through their initiative and great efforts, ARCASIA and the Central European architectural organisation, the V4AF began to work closely together. We are currently jointly planning the 4th Round Table on Cultural Heritage Management. As a result of their initiative and foresight, the memorandum was signed between ARCASIA and V4AF in 2018. ARCASIA has established similar relationships with several regional organisations, eg. with ACE and AUA.

Cross-border internships, student and teacher exchange programmes, young architects job placement at a global level, etc. shall be the fruitful nation-building schemes that ARCASIA can perform.

Our Country's Prime Minister, the Provincial Governor and Chief Minister all graced the occasion, cementing the value what ARCASIA can be as a platform.

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Architecture for our planet

From a bright-eyed, bushy-tailed architecture student to a young Architect, I have seen - within the span of a decade - the conversation of Asian architecture evolve from traditionalism to futurism, from the vernacular to the global, and from regional culturalism to a global concern for the planet. This has been especially apparent in ARCASIA, with the relatively new ACGSA (ARCASIA Committee for Green and Sustainable Architecture) and ACYA (ARCASIA Committee on Young Architects) set-ups, which indicate that at least one eye is being cast on sustainability and the future of our profession.

My professional work in architecture has been focused on green buildings and sustainability, and I have, from time to time, taken on adjunct professorship roles at the Architecture and Sustainable Design schools at SUTD (the Singapore University of Technology and Design) and NUS (the National University of Singapore). With architecture being a high contributor to the world's energy problems, the conversations are rife and the time is right for Architects to (try to) save the world. These pursuits have also led me to chair the Sustainability committee at the SIA, and to lead SIA's efforts in sustainability at the ACGSA. Architects should talk about climate change, biodiversity and other environmental issues, and find ways of mitigating it - not only because it is our job as shapers of the built environment, but because we, too, are part of the problem.

ARCASIA and me

In 2006, I was fortunate to be a student representative at the ARCASIA Student Jamboree in Beijing, as the President of the TAS (The Architecture Society) at the National University of Singapore. I saw, first hand, the fervour of ARCASIA and the cross-discussions that young architects had with the more experienced architects, and I had thought, then - wouldn't it be great if I would one day have the opportunity to also serve ARCASIA - and the architecture community at large.

Fast forward 10 years, on the recommendation of Ar. Rita Soh (President of ARCASIA, 2019-2020), I became Chairman Elect of ACYA, before chairing the committee from 2017-18, leading a group of energetic young architects (by definition, below the age of 40, but by spirit, certainly younger than that!) and guided by then President Ar. Jahangir Khan. I now serve Immediate Past Chair for the same committee, as an advisor, and have "graduated" from ACYA to lead one of the pillars of ACGSA, in responding to the UN SDGs and championing the New Urban Agenda.

In 2017, on the kind invitation of IIA's Ar. Gyanendra Shekhawat (then convener; now the Chair of ACAE - the ARCASIA Committee on Architecture Education), I was a speaker at the Asian Congress of Architects forum in the resplendent city of Jaipur, India. This was a career highlight as well, as it was one of my first international speaking appointments.

My ACYA term also saw the first Stormathon (“brainstorm-a-thon”, a term coined by my ACYA predecessor Ar. Fawad Suhail Abbasi) being conducted in Chiang Mai, Thailand, on the gracious hosting of ASA (the Association of Siamese Architects). It sparked off conversations focusing on a few choice issues that young Architects were – and to some extent, still are – facing, namely the prestige of the profession, how it can become more relevant to our global environmental concerns, as well as how it can adopt ever-evolving digital and intelligent technologies.

The second year saw the Young Architects forum being an integral part of the Pecha Kucha programme at ACA (Asian Congress of Architects) 18 Tokyo, where I presented a portfolio of architectural work in Singapore – *pecha kucha*-style, i.e. 20 slides x 20 seconds each. This was held at the ethereal, Kurokawa-designed National Art Centre in Tokyo, and organised by Japan’s Ar. Shinichi Saito. It represented the first major design event where the ARCASIA Young Architects received significant attention and focus. Also sharing on their respective cities were Pakistan’s Ar. Fawad, Indonesia’s Ar. Denny Setiawan and Hong Kong’s Ar. Simon Cheung. This event was a culmination of what ACYA means – celebrating architecture, cities, youth and a cross-border, cross-cultural spirit across ARCASIA nations. This too was a personal career highlight, with the recording of the event becoming an official Pecha Kucha vodcast on YouTube.

Outside of these formal events, friendships were made and forged, and I had also been invited to speak at BINUS University in Jakarta, where Ar. Denny lectures, in 2017, and at the KLAF (Kuala Lumpur Architecture Festival) in 2019, on the invitation of Ar. Ridha Razak. These speaker exchange programmes continue to this day.

The UN SDGs (Sustainable Design Goals) have played a role in underpinning these discussions, and it became apparent that ACYA members are concerned with what Architects can do in the sea of issues that the planet faces. The progress of these discussions to ACGSA, ACSR and ACAE was therefore a natural one, as it reaches out to a broader international audience of Architects for a better world.

Investing in youth for future leadership

In two years, we have grown from a gathering of hopeful younglings to a defined committee, who have successfully defined the role of the young Asian Architect in a time of environmental plight.

What has therefore become very obvious to me is that ARCASIA represents a platform where young architects can have a strong voice on issues affecting the profession, and that voice can then be turned into positive action through active participation. The youth of ARCASIA will then grow into respective roles in various committees, such as India's Ar. Gyanendra Shekawat with ACAE (Architectural Education), Thailand's Ar. Rattapong "Art" Angkasi with ACSR (Corporate Social Responsibility), Pakistan's Ar. Ramiz Baig who went on to become the Council's Honorary Secretary, and myself in ACGSA. Concomitantly, it primes young architects to also step up for leadership roles in their respective home institutes of architecture.

I'm pleased that these initial conversations have been continued by my succeeding committee, leading to fervent conversations in the ARCASIA realm, and also into the "senior" ACGSA and ACAE committees. This demonstrates the importance of a robust framework of action-based discussions, even as leadership changes hands from one term to another.

What, then, would the ARCASIA of the future be?

The future of ARCASIA would contain elements of the old - precious lessons learned, and it would continually renew itself in adapting to new global, environmental and even geopolitical challenges. It will not only be relevant to the world, but as Asia, we will lead the world towards a new urban order.
