ARCASIA STANDARD FOR MRA,

At ARCASIA MRAs in reference to the profession of architecture should only be of

“mutual advantage to all” (maa) but should not be of disadvantage to anyone.

Given below are the basic foundations to start with agreed:

- 1. Acceptance of the credentials of a licensed/registered Foreign**
- 2. Recognize minimum number of years of defined professional experience.**
- 3. knowledge of the codes, laws** and other matters applicable
4. Set a Criteria for recognizing post-registration/licensure practice experience
5. The nature and responsibilities of the **designated governance committee** with respect to overseeing administrative processes implementing a MRA such as transmission of documents, fees, verification of experience and other matters.
6. Where an applicant does not meet the above criteria, an assessment will be made by his/her Competent Body.



MRA difficult to achieve / shift to guide line on Collaboration

Case studies on CROSS BORDER COLLABORATION

Practice in a Host Nation

Definition:

Practice in a host nation occurs when **an individual architect or corporate entity** of architects either seeks a commission or has been commissioned to design a project or offer a service in a country other than his/her/its own.

Background:

There is an interest in increasing the responsible mobility of architects and their ability to provide services in foreign jurisdictions. There is also a need to promote the awareness of local environmental, social, and cultural factors and ethical and legal standards.

Policy:

Architects providing architectural services on a project in a country in which they are not registered **shall collaborate with a local architect to ensure that proper and effective understanding is given to legal, environmental, social, cultural, and heritage factors.** The conditions of the association should be determined by the parties alone in accordance with UIA ethical standards and local statutes and laws.
