Challenges to Standardization & Fair Compensation

- **Lack of Strong Professional Body:** While the Lao Architect Association exists, it lacks the strong regulatory power and fee guideline enforcement seen in some more mature markets. There is no universally mandated fee scale.
- **Price-Based Competition:** The intense focus on low price as the primary selection criterion often leads to unsustainable fee levels, compromising design quality, thoroughness of documentation, and adequate site supervision.
- **Informal Economy:** Part of the market operates informally, further depressing fee expectations.

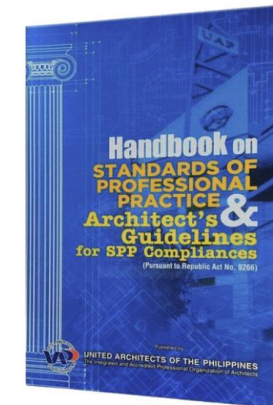
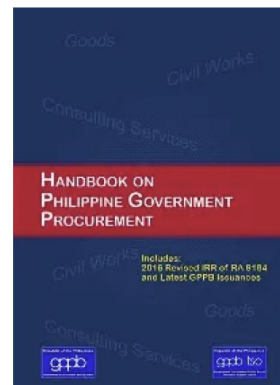

Fee Stakeholder System (LAM-BOS)

A Proactive Measure:

Implemented in January 2025 for 'sell-then-build' housing projects led by registered developers.

Mechanism:

Housing developer projects must be registered.

Fee payments are processed via a stakeholder-managed account.

Benefits:

Greater payment certainty and milestone tracking.


Formalised scope and fee documentation.

Protection against untracked scope creep.

Establishes national fee data for benchmarking.

Significance:

A meaningful structural reform to restore fee integrity.

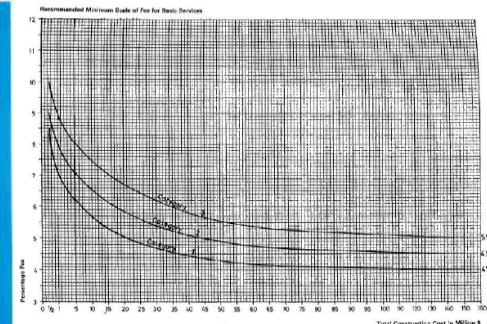
SIA Scale of Fees & Singapore Competition Act

2005 Onwards

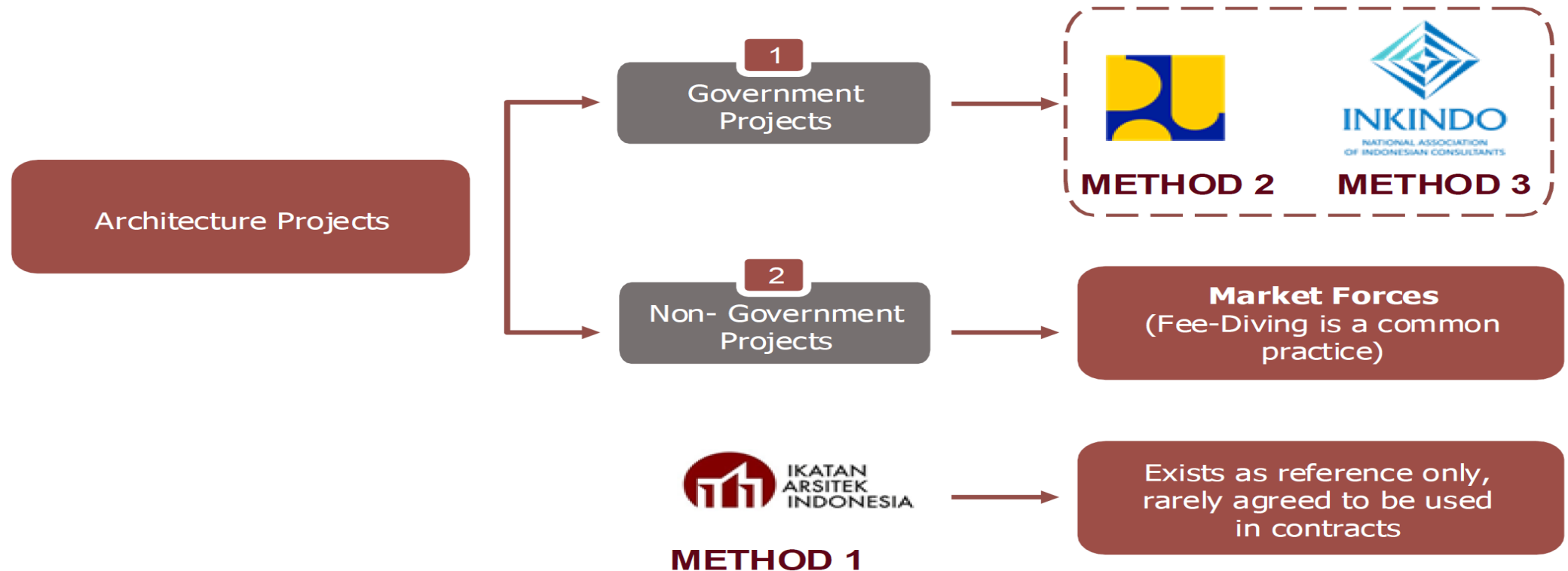
Market-Driven Competition

Implementation of Singapore Competition Act eliminated standardized fee scales, introducing free market competition and fundamentally reshaping professional service pricing dynamics.



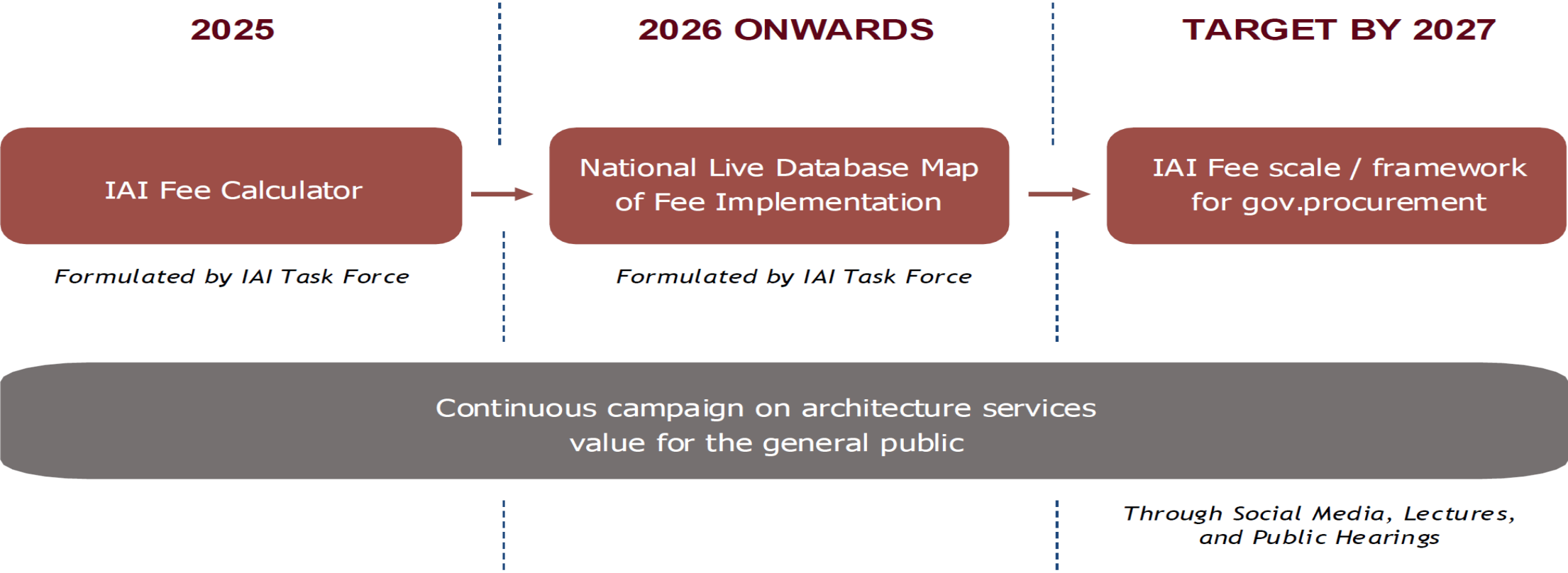

3. Current Practices in BRUNEI DARUSSALAM

- **Brunei (IAPB/BAPEQS):** Fees are still linked to the statutory scale of minimum fees under the Architects, Professional Engineers, and Quantity Surveyors Order (CAP 114). However, increasing competition and direct negotiations have introduced elements of market determination.
- While the Architects Act provides for a Schedule of Minimum Fees, enforcement is increasingly difficult, and clients often demand discounted or lump-sum fees.
- With deregulation, fee scales are no longer mandatory, leading to competitive bidding. This has raised concerns about fee undercutting and compromised quality.
- Fee guidelines exist but it is only as a reference, are often negotiated based on project scale, client resources, and market conditions.

VAA-ARCHITECT PRACTICES ON PROFESSIONAL FEES

- There are 5 legal framework for architect fee.
- The Architect's fee or design's fee is depended on scale of project, types, grade and investment scales.
- No regulatory fee for landscape and interior design.

LESSON LEARN AND SUMMARY

- The Architect's fee is depended on scale of project, types, private or government projects, Project size/skill and experience and scope of works of Architects
- Most of the MIs have Act/legal regulation for Architect fees
- Some of MIs recent prepare but still practices and learn from the practices.
